Some 500 former students and friends of Miss Bertha P. White, long-time mathematics instructor of the Centralia high school, gathered at the Lewis-Clark hotel Sunday, July 20, in the afternoon to attend a reception in her honor as she prepared to retire following 25 years of teaching young people of Centralia.

Miss White was a former resident, the youngest and one of two surviving members of the elder Mr. and Mrs. Johnson White (Mary White) for whom the Mary White bridge was named.
