Rev. Mrs. Douglas Returned to C. G. For Another Year

At the annual conference held at Portland and concluding Saturday evening when Bishop L. R. Marston read the appointments Rev. Mrs. Douglas was reappointed to the local Free Methodist church for the fourth year. This is something of a record of pastoral service for the local church as the pastors for several years previous to the coming of Mrs. Douglas, served but 1 year each. The conference and camp meeting which was held in connection with it near Crestdale Drive, Portland, is said to have been the largest in attendance for many years. Rev. Nathan Cohen Beskin, known as America's leading Christian Hebrew preacher and whose messages over the nation, was the camp evangelist. Rev. Beskin was an ordained Rabbi in Russia, the country of his birth, and was a schoolmate of Joseph Stalin, Rev. and Mrs. Lawrence M. Arksey of Portuguese East Africa also a number of other missionary speakers were present. Departments of young people, Sunday schools, junior and women's missionary work were well represented.

All Ore Counties At Oregon State

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Post summer session registration here reached 816 at the end of the first week of the five-week session, almost exactly the same number as were enrolled a year ago. Men outnumber women 672 to 144.

Of the 7902 different students who attended one or more terms for the regular college year ending last June, Oregon counties contributed 7068 while 777 came from 39 other states, 9 from Hawaii and Alaska, 48 from 10 other countries, and 1 from Washington, D. C., Registrar D. T. Ordeman reports.

Every county was represented, with Multnomah, Benton, Clackamas, and Linn topping the list in that order, while Wheeler had the fewest with five. Out-of-state students were slightly fewer in number last year than the year before due to drastic restrictions in favor of Oregon applications. Canada with 14 and India with 11 sent most foreign students here. Other countries represented were China, Columbia, Cuba, Egypt, Norway, Persia, Turkey, and the Philippines.
