Cash Awards Given 80 Navy Civilians

Extra cash awards ranging from \$150 to \$1250 were recently granted to eight Navy civilian employees for previously submitted suggestions.

The extra awards, made by the Navy Department Beneficial Suggestion Board, are based on Navy-wide application of the suggestions during the first year of their use. These extra awards are in addition to initial awards of \$250 received by each individual from the Naval activity where he is employed.

The total savings will exceed \$1,000,000. Vernon R. Dunlap, progressman, Puget Sound Naval Shipyard, Bremerton, Wash., suggested a method of valve stem manufacture. He proposed that bar stock of near stem size be "upset" to form the collar in a bolt forging machine. The adoption of this suggestion resulted in conservation of a highly critical material and a saving in time and labor cost. Mr. Dunlap was given an extra award of \$310.
