Miss E. Heaton Is Promoted to T-4

TOKYO — Earnestine Heaton, Creswell, Oregon, has been promoted to the rank of Technician Fourth Grade, it was recently announced at General MacArthur's Headquarters in Japan.

A member of the 8225th WAC Battalion, T-4 Heaton is assigned to duty in the officers' personnel section of The Adjutant General's Office at Occupation headquarters.

A graduate of the Cottage Grove High School in 1942, the WAC sergeant attended the University of Oregon at Eugene before entering the WAC in October 1943.

T-4 Heaton received basic training at Fort Des Moines, Iowa, and attended Company Administration

School at Conway, Arkansas. During World War II she served at Oro Bay, New Guinea, and in the Philippines. She sailed from the U. S. for duty in Japan in November 1946.

T-4 Heaton wears the Asiatic Pacific theater ribbon, with two battle stars, the Philippine Liberation ribbon, Good Conduct, Victory and Occupation ribbons.

Pick Sweet Corn Late Afternoon

Sweet corn picked during the late morning or afternoon is sweeter than that harvested early in the morning. That is a timely garden reminder from W. B. Parker, assistant county agent, who explains that sugar is stored in the corn during the day and changes to starch at night.

A second pointer for getting top quality in home grown garden products is to remove the tops from root crops very soon after digging. While in the ground, the plant feeds from the soil; but when the plant is dug, the tops draw upon the food stored in the root and thus reduce its value. This applies to all root crops, including beets, carrots, turnips and parsnips for example.

If ground is available in good shape for planting, this is a good time to plant some fall spinach, mustard, turnips, radishes, and lettuce, Parker adds.

During the past year the United States exported more than 16½ million long tons of foodstuffs.

Farm Trends in Nation Shown in Economic Report

Several important factors related to the agricultural outlook are set forth in the mid-year economic report of the president to congress, says L. R. Breithaupt, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State college. The report is the second to be transmitted in accordance with the Employment act of 1946 and was prepared with the assistance of the Council of Economic Advisors and other government agencies.

The report states that "in view of the existing uncertainties in the farm outlook it is the duty of food growers, processors, and the government to keep the public currently informed of the real facts concerning our food supply." One such fact is there is "no general or present scarcity of farm and food products as a whole." Despite prospects for a smaller corn crop than the very large crop of 1946, "we may still obtain a total agricultural output as large as last year," the report says.

After pointing out that we are at a record high point in civilian production with 60 million civilian jobs filled, only 2½ million workers unemployed and various other evidences of prosperity, warnings are sounded. According to the report, "The unprecedented prosperity of our nation must not be a cause for idle self-congratulation." It says that we must remember that full employment at a high price level is being sustained by temporary props such as, (1) reconversion demands of business, (2) backlog demands of customers, (3) extensive use of savings and credits, and (4) an extraordinary excess of exports over imports.

As these props grow weaker, there will be need of many economic readjustments to attain a peace-time economy that is stable at a maximum level. These adjustments take time, but must be made before the lack of them results in serious unemployment and business decline, the report says.

The report adds that food exports helped boost prices, but that U. S. exports of all goods the first half of 1947 ran at a rate over a billion dollars a month in excess of imports. About half of the deficit was financed by the government. This prop is one that may weaken as the months go by.

HOUSING TIGHT AT OSC AS APPLICATIONS SET RECORD

PROSPECTIVE students are strictly on their own so far as housing is concerned from now until the opening of freshman week September 15, college officials are now advising all inquirers. All college controlled housing for both men and women, both on the campus and at Adair village, is over reserved already.

Although some 2600 new students have already been accepted for entrance this fall, permission to register will continue to be issued to qualified Oregon applicants until or unless the prospective total enrollment exceeds the 8000 for which instructional facilities are being provided. A detailed survey of private housing facilities has been made and a campaign to encourage more home owners to take in students, but the limit seems to be about reached, officials state.
