## Lillies May Reach Public Thru Chain Stores in Oregon

Mass marketing of Easter lily bulbs through chain stores may help solve the problem of this year's surplus production of bulbs in western Oregon, reports J. C. Moore, assistant extension marketing economist at O. S. C. Moore has been working with a special marketing committee of the Pacific Bulb Growers association which has requested the Oregon Chain Store association to help market the surplus.

Under the plan proposed, medium sized bulbs suitable for gardens or house plants would be offered to the public at popular prices. The industry estimates the surplus above normal trade demands may amount to more than 18 million bulbs this year.

## 'Union Label Week' To Be Sept. 1-6

Governor Snell is one of the first governors to enlist in a regional movement to designate the week beginning on Labor day as "Union Label Week". The purpose is to make consumers conscious of the value of using superior products made in America under sanitary conditions and wage conditions that assure the workers an American standard of living.

In designating the week of September 1-6 as Union Label Week, Governor Snell says:

"The Union Label is the American's guarantee that the product is not the result of sweatshop or child labor; that it has been made in a factory or shop where health destroy good citizenship; that it is an American product, and that it is the work of expert craftsmen who have subscribed to a high standard of skill."

"The Union Label is a symbol of the entire movement of organized labor, which has enabled this country to build up the highest living standard in the world."

"During this week organized labor will properly ask recognition and approval for the progress made toward a broader application and understanding of the rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

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## Blue Cross Plan Protects 28 Million

More than 28,000,000 persons in the United States and Canada are now protected against hospital expense by Blue Cross nonprofit plans, according to Frank F. Dickson, executive director of Oregon Blue Cross. "During the second quarter of 1947, nearly 1,500,000 persons joined Blue Cross, to swell the total enrollment to 28,330,166. Of this number 70,000 are Oregonians," said Dickson. "Although the cost of Blue Cross membership has increased to keep pace with the rising hospital costs, enrollment has also increased, a fact that testifies to public recognition of the need for protection against the financial hazards of unexpected illness or accident."

Nineteen states and three Canadian provinces have enrolled more than 20% of their residents. Dickson reported, Rhode Island leading with 69.46% of her total population in Blue Cross.
