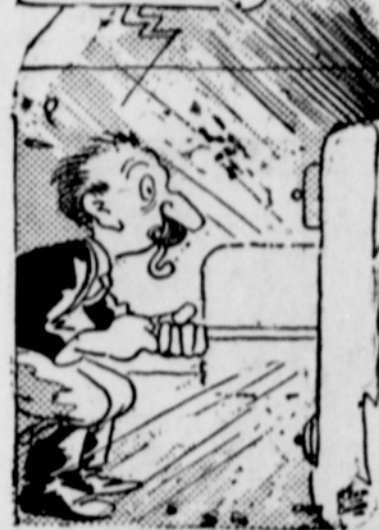

4-H Auction at State Fair to Be Fair to All

A new plan for the 4-H club state fair fat stock auction has been announced by L. J. Allen, state club leader, following completion of arrangements with Leo Spitzbart, manager of the state fair September 1 to 6.

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Under the plan agreed upon, each exhibitor will be limited to one sale until all with stock in the auction have made one sale. After that the remaining animals will be sold singly or in groups. This plan was devised to give all exhibitors an equal opportunity to market to advantage their fat lambs, hogs and steers exhibited at the fair. The auction is scheduled to start at 10 o'clock, September 5.

With at least 1500 boys and girls from every county scheduled to take part in the fair this year, as contestants and livestock exhibitors, arrangements have also been made to "stagger" reservations at the 4-H club dormitory so as to accommodate the largest number possible. Contests have been scheduled throughout the week, and each contestant, other than those with livestock exhibited also, will stay only two days in the dormitory.

Winning entries in local or community 4-H fairs go on to the state fair. With the program throughout the state expanded since the war, a record number of exhibits are expected this fall, says Allen.

Four booths have been constructed for junior and senior "dollar dinner" contests and for demonstrations. These will be in use constantly throughout the week, so large is the entry list. The top demonstration teams at the state fair—one in agriculture and one home economics—will represent Oregon later at the Pacific International Livestock exposition in Portland October 3 to 11.

Bean Growers in Constant Battle With Virus Disease

The western bean industry, both seed and canning, is engaged in a constant battle with virus diseases—a battle which drew major interest at the Western Bean Conference at Twin Falls, Ida., reports Dr. F. P. McWhorter, plant pathologist at the O. S. C. experiment station.

Dr. McWhorter was one of three Oregon delegates to the conference which drew representatives also from Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Washington, Utah, Colorado and Nebraska. The next conference will be in Nebraska.

Other Oregon men on the program were B. F. Dana, federal pathologist, who reported on the progress of his bean breeding work to top resistant varieties, and Dr. Joe Chamberlain, USDA entomologist from Forest Grove, who reported on control work with insect pests of beans.

A yellow bean mosaic, similar to that which attacks Blue Lake canning beans in Oregon, has attacked beans grown for seed and is now a chief factor in their production in western states. Dr. McWhorter was asked to report on this disease as it affects the green bean crops in Oregon.

A "common" bean mosaic of seed beans, which is a seed-borne disease, has been known for many years and disease resistant varieties have been developed to avoid it. Dr. McWhorter explained. Now a new strain of this, also seed-borne, that attacks the previously disease resistant varieties, has appeared. For want of a better name it was dubbed the "uncommon common" mosaic at the conference.

Seedsmen from many parts of the United States and their own plant breeders at the conference and all showed keen interest in doing everything possible to avoid selling any seed to the public that carried disease, Dr. McWhorter found.

Field trips were taken by all delegates to the conference to acquaint them with the different virus diseases in bean fields. In some states inspection for certification is now so strict that presence of any seed-borne virus in a bean field disqualifies the whole field for seed purposes, said Dr. McWhorter.
