LAW SCHOOL ENROLLMENT IS UP 34 PER CENT
UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, October 14 (Special) University law school registration has increased 34 per cent over the registration of fall term a year ago, Dean Orlando John Hollis announces. Total enrollment this year is 206, as against the 151 in the school a year ago. Enrollment two years ago, for fall term of 1945, was only 27.

This fall's enrollment includes 199 men and seven women. Broken down into classes, the following numbers show: first-year students, 127; second-year, 51; and third year, 27.

Veterans in the school number 188, of which 187 are men and one a woman.

Charcoal Plant

Development of a plant to produce a ton of charcoal per day, and a long-term test in the use of secondary species of Oregon's forest trees for railroad ties, are among the plans the Oregon Forest Products laboratory at Oregon State college has for the immediate future, Dr. Phimister B. Proctor, technical director of the laboratory has announced.

Now housed in the new industrial laboratory building south of the campus heating plant, the laboratory is installing machinery and equipment as rapidly as materials and labor are available. When completed the laboratory will be the largest wood products research plant in the nation operated by a state.

The charcoal project is to be conducted in cooperation with the Bonneville Power administration and industrial firms needing charcoal in their operation. The technique of making charcoal briquets from sawdust was worked out on a small scale at the laboratory several years ago.

Railroad ties cut from various forest species not useful for the regular lumber trade will be processed in treating plants operated by the Southern Pacific company and will then be put in service along the Pacific Coast and in southwestern states. Observation and tests over at least a 20-year period is planned for this project.

Installation of a pilot plant for extracting wax from lignin is to be accomplished soon by adapting a piece of war surplus equipment. More complete utilization of hemlock and fir bark is the objective of another comprehensive chemical and physical study under way.

Income from the new state privilege tax on lumber cut has been added to the regular state appropriation for the laboratory, making possible expansion of both staff and facilities. Eight full-time men are now on the staff to conduct studies in wood chemistry, carbonization, lumber seasoning, wood preservation, plywood and other laminated products fiberboard, and other related fields.
