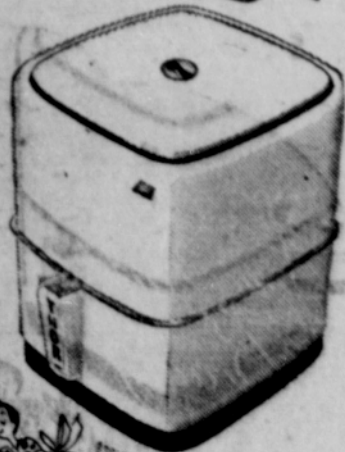

There is always one thing that a person can write or talk about and that is the weather. A person in the poultry business can talk, write, or do something about the weather when it comes to laying hens. The pullets should be laying very nicely now but it is also a nice time to have a slump, when the pullets are put into the laying house they are still growing. Laying and growing at the same time takes lots of good feed and stored vitamins in the pullets body. If they did go into the laying house a little run down at this time they sometime will go into what they call a neck molt. Gold weather doesn't help now and very changeable weather doesn't help either.

Old hens should now be out of their molt but if some of them still don't lay or the feathers are not fully grown out, they also should have some special care. Old hens should only take 6 weeks to go through their molt but if they haven't got back into lay they should either be culled or forced hard to get back into winter lay.

If you have pullets or old hens not laying it is a very good practice to feed at noon a wet crumbly mash mix. Part laying mash and 1 part water makes it just so it will crumble and not be wet and runny. Feed this at noon what they will clean up in 30 to 40 minutes. Here is hoping that your hens are laying 100% so you don't have to worry and have happy poultyless Thursdays.

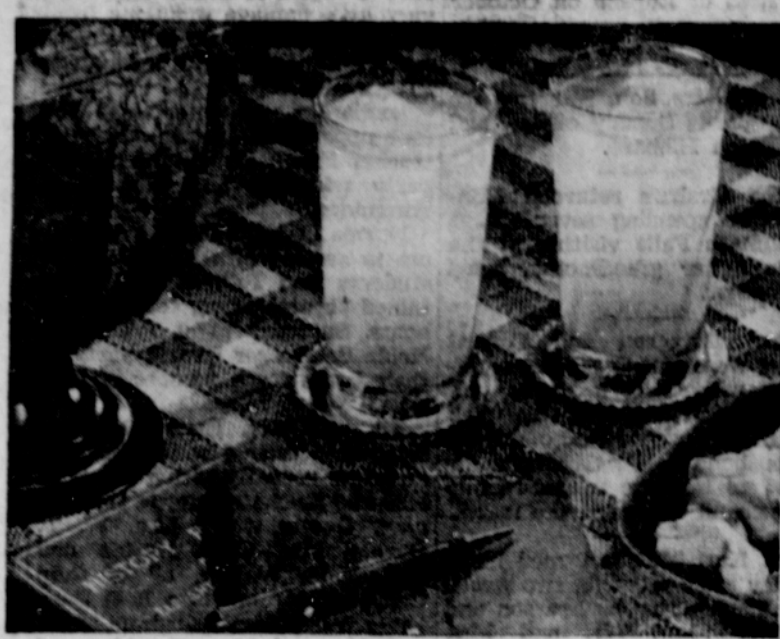

COOKERY CORNER

GINGER CREAM

1/2 cup light cream
1/4 tablespoon powdered sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Ginger ale

Combine cream, sugar and vanilla, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Divide into two tall glasses and fill the glasses with chilled ginger ale. Stir gently. Serves 2.

A delightful cookie to have on hand to serve with the refreshing drink is:

WALNUT DROP COOKIES

2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup chopped walnuts
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 egg
1/4 cup milk

Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt; stir in the walnuts. Cream shortening until soft, gradually beat in sugar, then vanilla and egg; add flour alternately with milk, beating until smooth after each addition. Drop from teaspoon onto greased baking sheet and bake in a 400 degree oven 8 to 12 minutes. Substitute black walnuts, pecans, hickory nuts, filberts, Brazil nuts, peanuts, cashews or coconut (1 cup) for walnuts, as desired; for plain drop cookies omit nuts. Approximate yield: 2 1/2 doz. cookies.

More Barn Hay Driers

Barn hay drying has proved its value and is rapidly expanding as a profitable haymaking practice. Despite wartime shortages of materials, many barn hay driers have been installed. Some of the advantages of barn hay curing are: Weather risk is minimized; 30 to 50 per cent more leaves are saved; hay retains 40 to 50 per cent more green color; 15 to 25 per cent more protein is retained; hay storage capacity is increased up to 50 per cent; hay can be cut and stored the same day, and spontaneous combustion danger is greatly reduced.

Wisconsin Fishing

In Wisconsin's 7,000 lakes and 10,000 miles of fishing streams are found great quantities of fish. One hundred forty-nine distinct species of fish are to be found in the waters of the state. Fourteen of these species have two or more sub-species, making in fact, a grand total of 174 species of recognized status. These fish have been classified roughly into game fish, pan and food fish, commercial fish and rough fish.
