Hospital Fund Is Boosted by Many Sundry Donations

We are not moving up the hospital thermometer past the \$100,000 mark this week for the reason that a late total of all subscriptions has not been made due to the fact that the campaign officials who keep tab on the totals are either out of town or ill. H. E. Eakin, treasurer, who has been ill at his home for several days reported last night that numerous contributions for \$25.00 and up continue to come in, but so far as he knew no sizeable donations have been made recently.

Encouraging features of the campaign is a report from Mr. and Mrs. Joe Throop of the Town Talk Cafe, stating that \$400.22 was ready for the fund. This amount was taken in during the operating hours of the cafe Sunday and the entire gross amount donated to the hospital fund, which included the cost of the food and the time of the employees which was also donated. Mr. and Mrs. Woodrume, who offered to donate the proceeds Sunday from a Thanksgiving dinner netted about \$27.50, but the small showing was due to the fact that the patrons failed to find where the Woodrume home was located. Fully fifty people tried to find the home but failed, Mrs. Woodrume stated.

Also encouraging is the report from Mrs. Cresswell that \$27.75 had been collected in the town of Creswell from bottles scattered throughout the business district.

Lumber Workers Ask for 30 Cents An Hour Increase

The Willamette Valley AFL lumber and sawmill workers concluding a two day session at Eugene Sunday, voted to ask for a thirty-cent per hour increase in wages to be effective as soon as negotiations can be completed. The action of the Eugene group which represents approximately 6,000 workers in the Willamette valley follows closely the similar action of the Puget Sound workers, who last month voted to ask for increased wages.

All negotiations will be handled by individual operators and it might be a few days before the negotiations get underway, it was indicated Monday.

Chas. Ross Trent Dies Tuesday Eve

New Milk Prices Effective Nov. 15

A new milk price will be effective November 15th, which represents an increase of 1 cent per quart in milk deliveries here. L. F. Hartwig of the Grove Maid Dairy said he was making the increase reluctantly. This locality, in the Eugene milk shed, will not get the raise that the Eugene dairymen are making however. There the price will raise 1 1/2 cents per quart. The new price is based on a five cent increase per pound in butterfat and a 20 cent increase per hundredweight to pay for milk solids not fat.

There is no increase in the price of cream.

Oregon's Traffic Annual Now Ready

Oregon's 1947 Traffic Annual, a 32-page booklet outlining the full story behind the state's most disastrous accident year in history, is ready for distribution this week, the Traffic Safety Division of the secretary of state's office has announced.

Based on detailed statistical summaries of all accident reports for 1946, the Annual highlights significant trends and developments in the state-wide traffic picture. Held up for special emphasis is the sharp climb in deaths and injuries following the return of unrestricted car travel after the war. Wrecks on the open highways, now accounting for three out of every four deaths, are also underlined.

"The booklet's chief value lies in the facts it makes readily available," the announcement said. "These facts are essential to any effective program for safer Oregon streets and highways."

Initial distribution is being made to schools, publishers, insurance companies, and other agencies concerned with accident prevention. A liberal supply is being held back to fill individual requests.

Lane County Chest Campaign to Get Underway 18th



The Lane county chest campaign will get underway over the South Lane county on the 18th, W. G. (Wally) Robertson, chairman announced here yesterday. The campaign will get underway following the kickoff dinner in Eugene on the evening of the 17th. In announcing a list of committees following his appointment on Monday, Mr. Robertson expressed a hope that the campaign might be finished by the 22nd.

Two county workers, William Barr of Eugene and Allen Wheeler of Goshen, visited here Monday and assisted in laying plans for the start of the campaign with Damon Scott, a member of the county committee. The quota for the South Lane district is \$7,000 or the same as last year while the quota for the county was set at \$117,000. The area to be served in the South Lane district including the communities surrounding Cottage Grove are: Saginaw, Walker, Delight Valley, Brumbaugh, Dorena, Culp Creek, Row River, Disston, Latham, London, Divide, Silk Creek, Cedars. Community chairmen are to be named later.

The local committees named by Mr. Robertson are: Special gifts, Geo. McCready; men's central, F. L. Hilliker; residential division, Mr. Fred Hollister; communities division, Neal Gwyn.

Robertson has requested all workers to stop by the Clark Studio and pick up the supplies needed in the coming event.

Douglas McKay to Be Candidate for Governor in 1948

Douglas McKay, Salem, state senator who managed Governor Earl Snell's campaign in 1946, will be a Republican candidate for governor next year, it was announced at Portland last week.

He became the first candidate disclosing his intentions to friends in Salem.

The 54-year-old automotive dealer said he had planned to run in 1951, but Governor Snell's death in a plane crash changed his time table.

He will seek the Republican nomination in the primaries next May for the unexpired portion of Snell's term, ending in 1951. Other off-mentioned Republican candidates include State Senator Dean Walker, Independence, former senate president.

Gov. John H. Hall, who as speaker of the house succeeded Snell, has not disclosed whether he will run.

McKay has been a senator since 1935 except for the time he was in the Army. He served 2 1/2 years in World War I and 3 1/2 years in World War II, leaving active service as a major.

Walnut Blight Covered in Technical Bulletin

Probably the most comprehensive scientific report ever issued on walnut blight (walnut blight) and its control has just been published by the O.S.C. experiment station as technical bulletin No. 9. Written by Dr. Paul W. Miller, federal pathologist, and Dr. W. B. Bollen, station bacteriologist, the 108 page bulletin covers the history of this most destructive of walnut diseases, the casual organism, and a full report on experiments leading to its control.

President Truman To Give Personal Message Monday

President Truman will deliver to a joint session of Congress in person Monday a message calling for stop-gap European relief aid and for inflation curbs at home.

The White House yesterday said Mr. Truman will speak to members of the House and Senate in the House of Representatives chamber at 1:30 p. m. (EST).

Mr. Truman is continuing a round of conferences with representatives of industry, agriculture and labor as he and his staff work on the special message.

The president called in M. W. Thatcher of St. Paul, Minn., president of the National Federation of Grain Cooperatives, and other representatives of this group including James Hill of Pendleton, Oregon. He also had an appointment with Earl O. Shreve, president of the United States Chamber of Commerce, and Philip Murray, CIO president.

He talked earlier in the week with William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, and on Monday with Earl Bunting, president of the National Association of Manufacturers.

Presidential Secretary Ross said the discussions have been concerned with the whole food situation and aid to Europe.

The decision to address the joint session Monday was announced after an agreement with congressional leaders.

Lions Drop Grid Battle to Millers In Quagmire 13-0

The Lions dropped the traditional battle to the Springfield Millers by a 13-0 count in a quagmire at Springfield.

The Millers paid off on their only drive of the night when they crunched sixty yards for a score in the first quarter. The Lions came right back with a drive that stalled on the Springfield four yard line. The only other scoring threat was by the Lions in the fading seconds of the game but it backfired into a Springfield touchdown instead.

The Lions were working on blocking Springfield's punts and twice little Mark Morgan was inserted into the line-up and slashed through to block the kick. The last one was recovered on the Springfield 21-yard line. By this time the field was such a swamp that three running plays failed to gain. A fourth down pass into the weak side flat was astray with the muddy ball and Don Barge of Springfield plucked it out of the air for a 72 yard scoring jaunt.

The Springfield "B" also copied a 7-0 victory in an Armistice Day clash at Kelly field.

Business Failures Are Rising Now

It is still tough to run a business. The man who can successfully operate a grocery store, a bank, a feed and grain business or a music shop, even in these days of high consumer purchasing power, is a man of substantial ability. This is proved by the latest figures on business failures.

Business failures are rising. They rose from a monthly average of 94 in 1946 to 277 for the first eight months of 1947. So far, this is by no means an alarming figure. War periods always bring a lot of new businesses into being; after the war, the rate of failure begins to rise. It was so after the Civil war, after World War I, and it is true now.

The figures on commercial failures are much more important than the attention usually given them. For they reflect the risks that a man, or a group of men, assume when they start a new business and create jobs for others. Instead of smearing all business enterprise with harsh phrases, legislators would do well to realize that business creates wealth for others even while it may be losing money itself.

State Treasurer Post Sought by O. R. Bean

PORTLAND—Ormund R. Bean, former state public utilities commissioner, announced his candidacy yesterday for the Republican nomination for state treasurer.

Bean, an architect, is the second Portlander to come out for the treasurership. State Sen. Walter J. Pearson announced last week his candidacy for the Democratic nomination.

Census of Dist. 45 Shows Total Of 1,157 Pupils

School census of school district 45, which is the grade school shows an enumeration of 1157 pupils, Mrs. E. R. Husted, enumerator, announced yesterday. Enumeration of the pupils of the grade school has been under way for some time and only recently completed.

Commenting on the results of the census, Elmer Fleming, superintendent said he figured that the enumeration this year would show at least 1,500 since 600 cards were used and this would have been less than three to the family. Now Fleming is trying to figure out ways and means of promoting bigger families.

Dorena Dam Basin Is Being Cleared

About 150 men are employed at the Dorena dam now clearing the basin and blasting and taking out rock for the concrete work. Clearing of the basin has been practically finished except where the blasting is underway, according to information from the Dorena engineer's office. Operations on pouring concrete for the dam is expected to start in February, at which time the force of workers will be augmented by about seventy-five.

Additional laborers are to be employed in April and the biggest number will be employed in June at the start of work suspended by rainy weather.

Progress at the dam is ahead of schedule, despite the fact that part of the dirt moving had to be suspended by the inclement weather.

Lumber Is Piling Up Here in Yards

PORTLAND—Lumber is piling up at West Coast sawmills in ever increasing quantities due to the critical shortage of railroad cars. H. V. Simpson said today. Gross stocks on hand at the end of October stood at 559,756,000 board feet, an increase of 54.7% in six months over the 361,778,000 board feet of last May. Mills south of Portland on the Southern Pacific system are feeling the pinch most severely.

Lumber production in the Douglas fir region for October continued at record levels, with weekly average totaling 146,382,000 feet, a slight increase over September production. Orders equalled production for October, averaging 146,201,000 feet, a jump of 13.7 millions over weekly averages for September. October shipments of 144,782,000 feet were almost identical with September's 143,055,000 feet.

"Continued strong order file calling for heavy lumber shipments throughout the next several months," Simpson said, "certainly indicates heavier than usual construction right through the winter on home and industrial building. Normally building slows during heavy weather months."

Cumulative orders for the first 44 weeks of 1947 were 6,223,601,000 b. f.; 44 weeks in 1946 was 5,614,558,000 b. f. and the 44 weeks of 1945 totaled 5,235,637,000 b. f.

Production for the first 44 weeks of 1947 reached 6,083,917,000 b. f.; same period in 1946 was 5,857,581,000 b. f. and for 1945 totals were 5,334,930,000 b. f.

Orders by markets for 44 weeks of 1947 were: rail, 3,942,757,000 b. f.; domestic cargo, 860,948,000 b. f.; export 832,960,000 b. f. and local 586,936,000 b. f.

Stassen Won't Accept Second Place, He Says

NEW YORK—Harold E. Stassen, asserting that he is "running for first place," said Friday night that he would not accept the Republican vice-presidential nomination in 1948.

Asked whether second place on a ticket headed by either General Dwight D. Eisenhower or Douglas MacArthur would be acceptable to him, the former Minnesota governor replied: "No, I am running for the presidential nomination."

Grove Airport to Be Surveyed Soon

Cottage Grove will be included in the field survey for fourteen municipal airports according to press dispatches from Portland Tuesday. E. M. Bartlett, state director of aeronautics reported plans for new airports and plans for expansion will be prepared this winter.

One member of the local airport committee said he hoped there would be sufficient interest in the proposal to improve the field of the Cottage Grove flying club, that plans might proceed. An airport here, even though a small one, is recognized as a necessity and if enough people are interested it is possible to get financial aid from the CAA.

Government Will Buy Eggless Hens

The government Monday offered to buy up hens which don't lay many eggs and put them into "deep freeze" for later use. The move is designed to save upwards of 30,000,000 bushels of grain for Europe in the next 11 months.

Simultaneously, Chairman Chas. Luckman of the Citizens Food committee called on the nation's milling industries to volunteer their help in the overall grain-saving program.

The hens will be killed, frozen and stored for resale next year when supplies of poultry and red meats are expected to be considerably smaller than now.

The agriculture department said the program was started at the request of organized poultrymen and major farm organizations.

The department will buy hens through poultry processors who will be required to pay farmers not less than 15 cents a pound, live weight, for hens weighing between 3 1/2 and 4 1/2 pounds, and 20 cents for those over 4 1/2 pounds.

The department in turn will buy the processed poultry at 22 1/2 cents a pound for grade A, New York-style dressed hens in the 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 pound class and 28 cents for those in the grade A 4 1/2 pound class. Grade B quality will bring 3 cents a pound less.

Committee Will Consider Car Shortage Problem

George T. Gerlinger of Portland, president of Willamette Valley Lumber Co., will head a committee of twenty-seven to study the freight car shortage. The committee convenes in Portland today and the original committee included six men from Lane county. Among the Lane county men was Fred Blickie, who stated Tuesday he would be unable to attend. Blickie said he thought the study of the committee would be confined more or less to a study of the possibilities of the freight car situation for next year.

So far this year the car shortage over the northwest has been critical and may continue bad for some time due to the high percentage of freight car loadings.

Change in Name for Pacific Highway Sought

The U. S. 99 Highway Association of Los Angeles wants to give the main West Coast arterial a border to border name.

It is known as the Pacific Highway in the northwest and the Golden State Highway in California. The Los Angeles Association has asked the Seattle Chamber of Commerce to pass along suggestions for a suitable name for the Canada to Mexico route.
