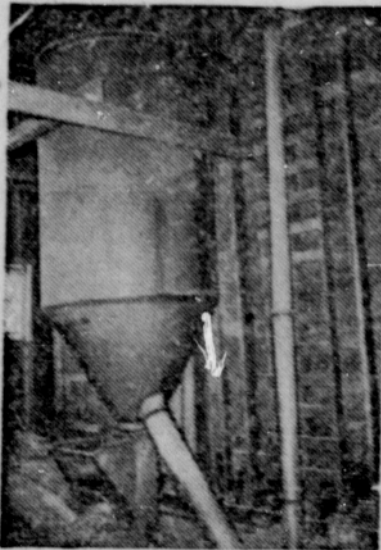
Automatic Mixers Available on Farm

Electricity Cuts Down On Farm Labor Costs

Feed mixing, like an increasing number of other farm chores, now is being placed on practically an automatic basis and coordinated with related activities. In this case, mixing is coordinated with cribbing and grinding operations.

Generally, mixers are located either adjacent to the grinder or in the barn mow almost directly above the mill. The two-ton mixer, shown in the accompanying illustration, is in the mow of a Midwestern farm. When processing operations begin, shelled corn, which has been blown

into a bin to the right of the mixer, drops through a chute to the grinder on the floor below. The blower pipe is shown at the right of the mixer.

After grinding has been completed, the ground grain is blown into the mixer and necessary supplements added. The thoroughly mixed grain then flows out of the mixer and down a chute to be loaded into a feed cart on the first floor.

The only manual work required is dumping the sacked supplement into the mixer. A conventional type blower crabs the whole grain automatically, while the blower attachment on the electrically powered grinder returns the ground grain to the mixer.

Setups of this type are becoming commonplace on scores of electrified farms. They can be constructed at relatively small cost and, in most cases, by unskilled farm labor.

TRAINING IN ARMED FORCES VALUABLE TO EMPLOYERS

Two Junction City women were rescued from the Long Tom river Saturday after their truck crashed off a bridge into the water. The driver, Violet Brooks, 18, said she kicked her way out of the cab, dragging a blanket that she thought was the coat of her mother, Mrs. Lela Brooks, 43, of Junction City. When she surfaced, two duck hunters rowed over and pulled her to safety.

A passing car stopped and Thomas Maloney and Floyd Borgard, Junction City businessmen, gave her first aid while Robert Scofield, Linfield College student, dove in to rescue the mother. He pulled her to safety and the women were rushed to town. The duck hunters left without giving their names.

OREGON GAME COMMISSION REPORTS BIRD LIBERATION

Pheasant liberations in the state of Oregon during 1947 was 48,074 birds, according to a report by the state game commission. Early plans called for the production of 30,000 birds but a combination of rains during the rearing season and shortage of labor prevented the commission from reaching the goal.

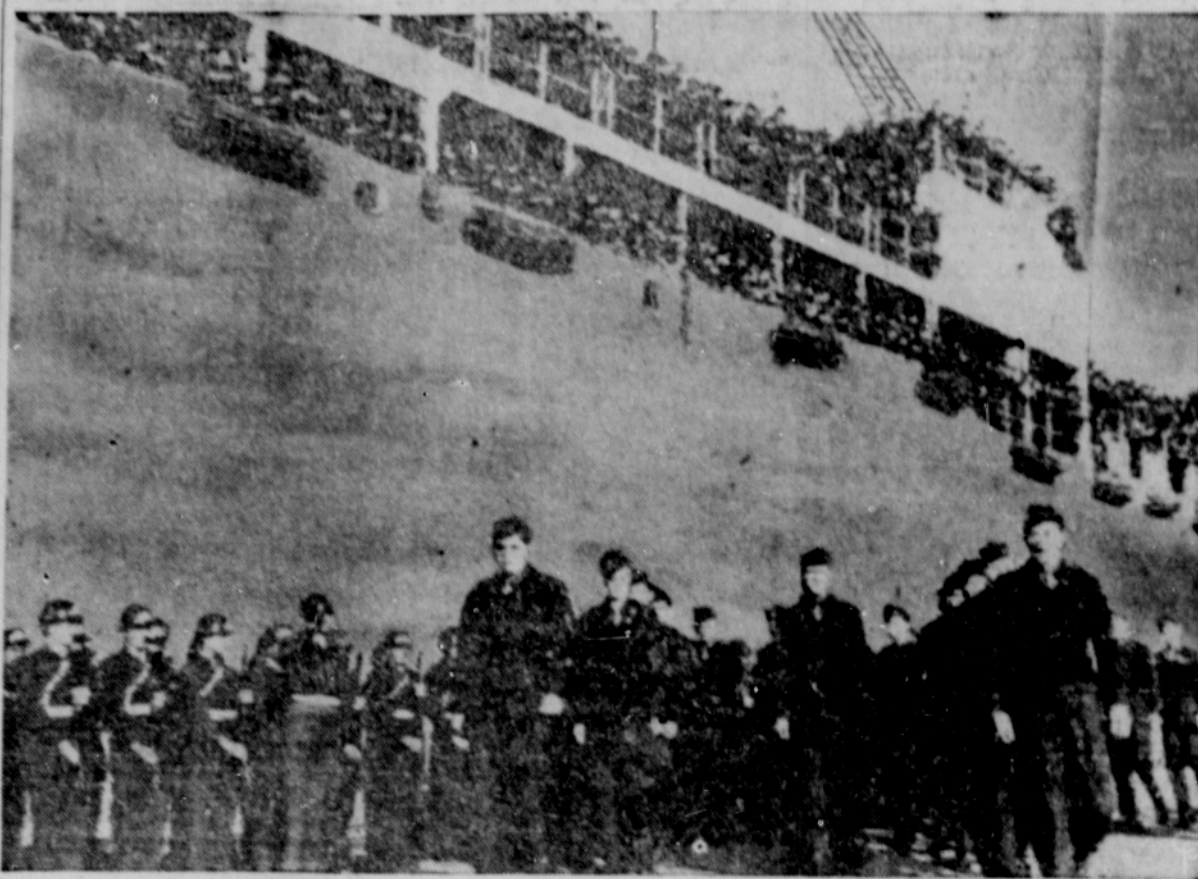
All the birds were banded prior to release and it is hoped that sportsmen will return bands of birds killed. The pheasants were released on the basis of quantity and quality of habitat available in each of the districts and at the same time giving consideration to the present density.

Number of birds released in each of the various districts of the state include the Willamette valley counties 20,593, southwest district 5,387, Klamath-Lake 2,729, Deschutes-Crook 1,530, Upper Columbia River district 5,204, Umatilla-Morrow 3,493; Northeast 8,509, Grant 1,200, Harney 1,047 and Malheur 380.
