The Art From England Ceramic tile was used in the United States even before the Revolution, but it has been manufactured here in large quantities for only the past 70 years. An English immigrant, Samuel Keys, was first to realize the great possibilities in tile making in this country and began experimenting with tile in 1867. Four years later he produced floor tiles which were favorably recognized. Then, in 1876, a tile manufacturing plant was opened in Pittsburgh, with Keys as superintendent. As tile became increasingly popular in homes and commercial buildings, other plants were founded in Ohio, New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania. After the last war, California also became an important tile manufacturing center.

The average normal adult will have from five to six quarts of blood in his body. Both male and female will have one-eleventh of their weight in blood.

Research men at various state colleges after trying benzene hexachloride, a chemical discovered in Europe and brought to this country for experimental use as a grasshopper poison, believe it is the best thing yet discovered for hog mange, as well as grasshopper control. The compound is a wettable powder that can be used as either a spray or dip for hogs and is sold under various trade names.

Indians Kept Secret For years the Indians of South America kept the secret of the source of curare, their ancient arrow poison. Sir Walter Raleigh first discovered its use in 1585. The active principle of curare is curarine. It has little action when taken into the stomach, but works fast when introduced into a wound. It has been used to aid in cure of lock jaw, but is claimed to have no direct curative effect.

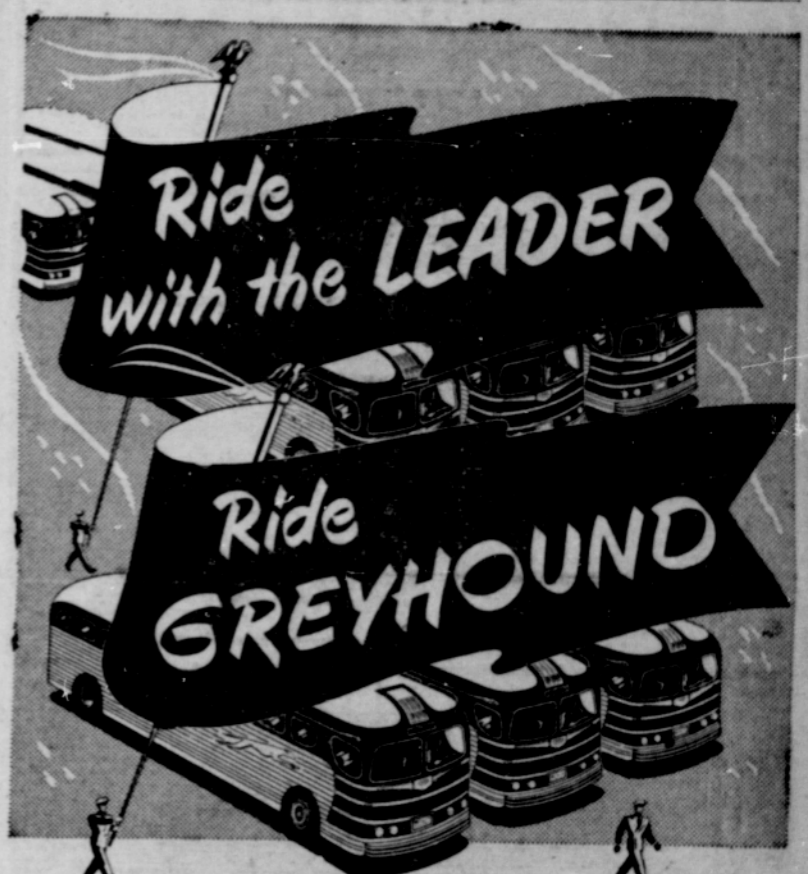
