A. & E. Mechanics School for Vets At Corvallis

Training to become an Airplane Mechanic is now possible in the State of Oregon.

A school fully approved by the C.A.A. and the Veterans Administration has been in operation at Corvallis since January, 1947.

This school, located on the large and busy municipal airport at Corvallis, offers complete training courses in Aircraft Engine and Aircraft Maintenance, repair, and overhaul.

The training period takes nine and one half months to complete. Each student receives 1920 hours of training. Approximately 70 per cent of this training is closely supervised practical work and 30 per cent classroom and theoretical training.

The training is open to all who are interested. Previous educational training or lack of educational training is not a barrier to taking this training. Each applicant is accepted or rejected entirely upon his own possibilities or potentialities.

Each student will receive 48 hours of training each week. This makes it possible for eligible veterans to receive full subsistence allowances. The tuition and equipment is also payable from the veterans educational entitlement.

There are barracks and restaurant facilities at the airport.

Classes start semi-annually, approximately. The next class starts February 16, 1948. For anyone interested in receiving additional information they may contact the Smith-Livingston Air Services, Inc., Box 531, Corvallis, Oregon.
