

Salmon Fishing Rules in Hands of Game Commission

A ruling of the state attorney-general has left sports salmon fishing regulations in the hands of the State Game Commission, the Commission announced at Portland Monday.

The Commission, which issued tentative 1948 fishing regulations last Saturday, said Attorney-General Neuner ruled that a bill passed by the last Legislature did not give the State Fish Commission authority to regulate sport salmon angling.

The bill mentioned gave the Fish Commission authority to regulate salmon angling with the concurrence of the State Game Commission.

Its title, however, only authorized the Fish Commission to regulate late commercial fishing, and

Neuner's opinion held that the Fish Commission could not regulate sports angling when that was not stated in the title.

Sportsmen's groups, which wanted salmon angling to remain under the Game Commission, had fought the measure during the last legislature.

Ice in Sealed Cans

Back again after a wartime absence is an ice that doesn't melt, a boon to picnickers and all who would keep things cold and still avoid the handicap of melting ice. It is a chemical packed in a 6 by 4 by 2 inch tin can. After 24 hours in the freezing compartment of a refrigerator, the fluid in the can becomes a solid block of ice. Two cans will keep the contents of a food basket cold for an entire day. The chemical can be frozen over and over again, because of a light-tight tin can that protects its potency, can be used for several years.

It's ideas for desserts we have for you today. First on the list is Apple Corn Flake Pancakes. Try them the next time you are hostess for dessert bridge or a late evening snack. Yes, pancakes, but light, toothsome pancakes with a difference. These are the giant variety with chopped apples and corn flakes added as flavorful ingredients. Layer the oversized cakes on your prettiest plate with spiced preserves—or your pet jelly—between layers. Sprinkle with powdered sugar, cut in generous wedges and serve with hot coffee. Don't save these for special guests only, they make a wonderful party ending for a leisurely family Sunday evening supper.

APPLE CORN FLAKE PANCAKES

- 2 cups sifted flour
- 5 teaspoons baking powder
- 1½ teaspoons salt
- 2½ tablespoons sugar
- 2 eggs
- 3 cups milk
- 2 cups slightly crushed corn flakes
- 6 tablespoons melted shortening
- 1½ cups finely chopped tart raw apples

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Combine well beaten egg and milk; add gradually to dry ingredients. Stir until blended. Add corn flakes, shorten-

ing and apples. Blend. Bake on a hot, lightly greased griddle. Yield: 4 cakes 10 inches in diameter.

Another suggestion for a dessert made extra good by cereal is

PEAR STRIDEL

- 3 cups sliced pears
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon lemon rind
- 5 cups corn flakes
- ½ cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine

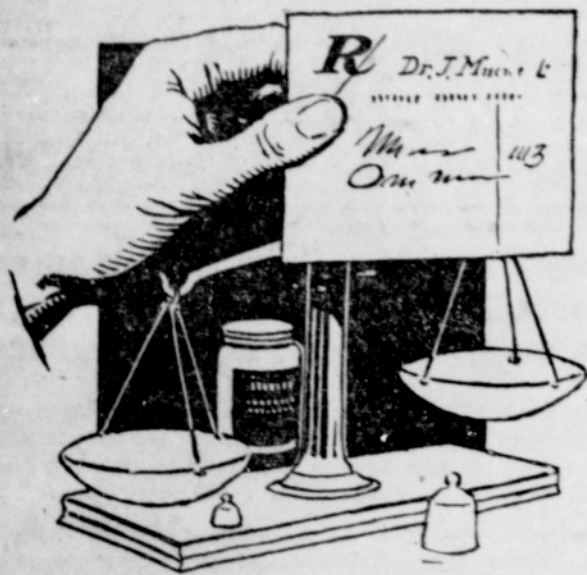
Combine pears with lemon juice and rind. Arrange layer of corn flakes in greased casserole. Cover with layer of pears, sprinkle with sugar and dot with butter. Repeat layers until all ingredients are used, sprinkling corn flakes on top. Cover casserole and bake in a 375 degree oven about 35 minutes or until pears are soft. Serve hot or cold. Yield: 6 servings.

CORN FLAKE CHEWS

- 2 cups corn flakes
- ¼ cup brown sugar
- 3 tablespoons light or dark corn syrup
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine

Measure corn flakes into buttered mixing bowl. Cook syrup and sugar together over moderate heat, stirring constantly until sugar is dissolved and mixture bubbles (about 5 minutes). Add butter. Pour hot syrup over corn flakes, stirring so that each flake is coated. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto wax paper and allow to cool. Yield: 20 ½-inch candies.
