## Walton League Offers \$100 Prizes

Whether knowledge of wild life and its protection shall be a text in the Oregon public schools is being taken to a new jury, the children themselves.

The State Division of the Isaac Walton League of America is doing it, by means of which several boys or girls will participate in \$100.00 allotted for prizes, with \$50.00 going to the winner of the contest, \$25.00 to the second, \$10.00 to the third and three prizes of \$5.00 each to the next three places, for writing the best essay opinion on a question that has been long debated by educators and outdoorsmen.

Title of Contest: "Why Conservation of Wildlife Resources Should Be Taught in the Public Schools."

Contest to be open to pupils enrolled in the eighth grade in Oregon schools for the year 1947-48. Essay to be at least 300 words in length, but not more than 500 words.

Essay must be original, and drawings or pictures may be used. Essay should emphasize the writer's local experience or otherwise bring out the local community problems.

Essay should show the importance of the relationship of the wildlife resource to the other resources of Oregon.

Contest ends March 1, 1948. Mail essay to Paul M. Dunn, Dean School of Forestry, Oregon State College, Corvallis, Oregon.

## 4-H Leaders in Two Conferences

Corvallis and LaGrande will again be the locations of the annual conferences of 4-H club leaders, January 27-29 and February 3-5, respectively. L. J. Allen, state club leader in the O.S.C. extension service, has announced.

Purpose of these conferences is to bring representative local leaders together to help develop plans for the coming year and to familiarize them with the general features of the 4-H club program. Allen said. Help is also given with specific problems of local leadership during the three-day schedule of events.

The Corvallis meeting will be for those in all parts of western Oregon and for the eastern Oregon counties within easy driving distance including Wasco, Jefferson, Crook, Deschutes, Klamath and Lake. About 150 to 200 local leaders together with all county extension agents active in 4-H club work are expected.

The LaGrande meeting will be for all other eastern Oregon counties and will be attended by about 100 leaders and extension agents concerned.

More than 2000 adults and older youth served as volunteer leaders for 2400 different clubs last year, Allen reports.

## MAN DROWNS IN POND

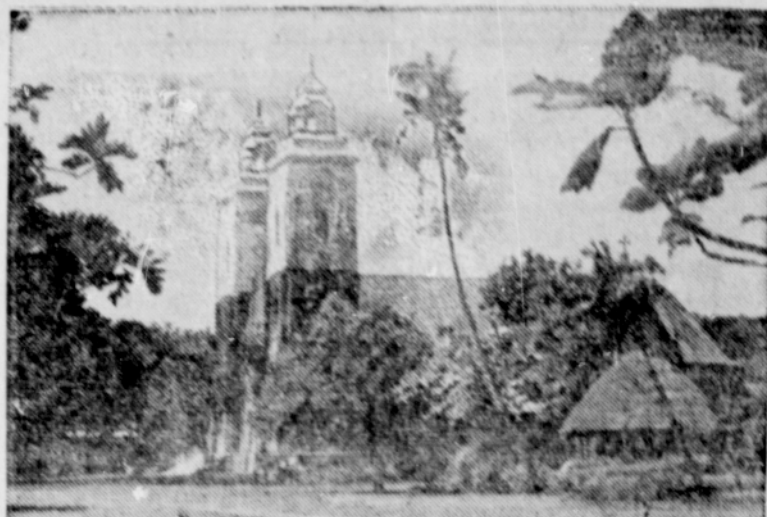
## COMPLETES RED CROSS COURSE

## SOVIET'S GOLD HOLDINGS

WASHINGTON — President Truman sent Congress Tuesday a report showing Russia's gold holdings are larger than any nation except the United States. The U. S. gold pile was put at \$22,780,000,000, more than one-third greater than the \$14,000,000,000 total held by the rest of the world on last June 30.

## Burns Featured In Post Article

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—The little city of Burns, Oregon will break into the national spotlight in the pages of the January 31 issue of Saturday Evening Post as the result of the successful effort of E. R. Jackman, O.S.C. extension farm crops specialist, to get a "break" for America's small towns.

Jackman, who has worked in the rural Oregon for close to 28 years, offered Editor Ben Hibbs of the post a story of Burns as a part of the series on American cities that magazine has been running for the past year or so.

"Even a hasty survey of our literature and art seems to indicate that if we have any truly national culture it stems from the small town and the nearby farm," says Jackman. "There individuality grows, flowers and bears strange fruit - sometimes just odd, other times laughable, but always interesting."

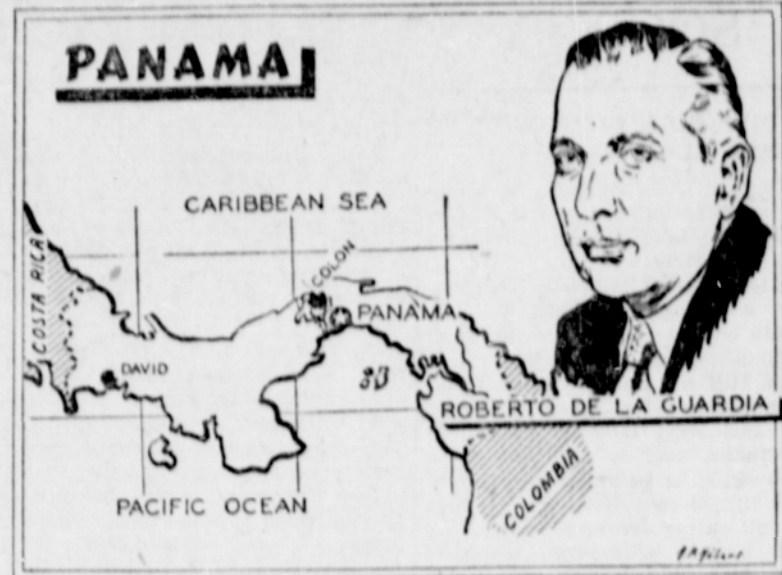
The article, to be well illustrated, consists mostly of anecdotes that Jackman has accumulated around Burns and elsewhere which he recounts in illustrating various phases of everyday life in this part of rural Oregon.

## U.N. Facts and Faces . . . . . PANAMA



Explorers of the New World satisfied their quest for a short overland route across the Americas in 1513 when Vasco Nuñez de Balboa sighted the Pacific Ocean from a hill in what is now Panama. Today, the Republic of Panama still furnishes the quickest ocean-to-ocean route by the United States-operated Panama Canal. From the ten-mile wide Canal Zone can be seen Panama's varied land, from jungles to high mountains. Many of her 640,000 people work in agriculture and forest industries in her 33,660 square miles. Her Representative at United Nations headquarters is Roberto de la Guardia. The Panamanian flag has white, red and blue squares and a red and a blue star.
