Hormone Feeding Of Chickens in Research Stage

Synthetic hormones, called estrogens, used to increase the rate of gain when fattening market poultry, are still very much in the experimental stage as far as Oregon State college recommendations for their use are concerned, states Noel L. Bennion, extension poultryman.

More experimental information is needed, Bennion explains, before he will give specific recommendations for their use. This is his answer to many recent inquiries from poultrymen who are expressing interest in the new fattening drug.

The estrogens, as they are properly called, are chemicals or drugs which produce capon or female characteristics in male birds and increase the rate and amount of weight gain. Similarly, female birds fatten more quickly when the hormone is used.

There are two ways in which the hormone may be introduced into the chicken. One method is through feed. The federal Food and Drug administration, however, will not permit estrogens to be mixed with commercial feeds. It has not been determined, Bennion explains, just what effect these hormones might have on humans if they ate chickens which have been fattened by the use of estrogens in feed.

Second method of introducing the estrogen is by the use of a pellet which is inserted under the skin of the bird. The Food and Drug administration will permit this method if minimum dosage recommendations are followed. In pellet form, the estrogen is slightly larger than a common BB shot. It is usually slipped under the skin by making an incision in the loose skin folds of the neck. After inserting, a stitch or two will hold the skin together and keep the pellet in place. The pellet is then absorbed.

Bennion suggests that poultrymen using this material follow the manufacturer's directions closely as to how often a pellet should be introduced. Depending upon the size of the bird, a new pellet will be required about every two weeks. Over dosage results in the bird being thrown off its feed and results in weight loss.
