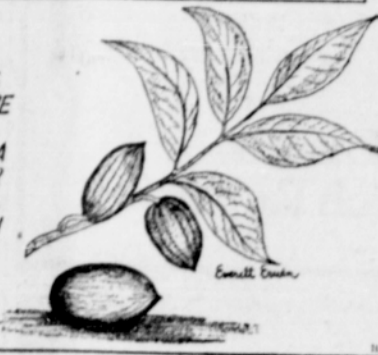
THE STRANGEST THING

THIS STRANGE LOOKING BIRD IS ONE OF NATURE'S ODDITIES. WITH A BEAK OVER A FOOT LONG AND A POUCH OF SKIN MORE THAN 6 IN IN DEPTH THEY USE IT TO STORE AWAY FOOD. THEY HAVE A DUFFLING SPREAD AND BODIES OVER 3 FT LONG CONTAINING NUMEROUS AIR SACS, MAKING THE HEAVY BIRD BUOYANT WHEN IN THE WATER.

THERE ARE ABOUT 100 DIFFERENT VARIETIES OF PECAN TREES IN TEXAS AND OTHER SOUTHERN STATES THERE ARE TREES SAID TO BE OVER 300 YEARS OLD. PECAN TREES YIELD A GREATER REVENUE THAN ANY OTHER TREE AND THE PECAN MEAT IS IN GREAT DEMAND. THE NUT GROWS IN A HUSK OR OUTER SHELL AND FALLS FROM THE OPEN HUSK WHEN RIPE.

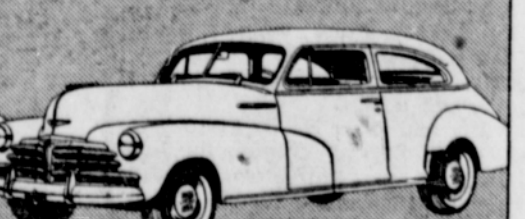
