TRAINING SHIP CARRIES MILK FOR HUNGRY BABIES
OAKLAND, California — The training ship Golden Bear put out on her annual cruise here recently with a unique cargo—more than 800,000 pounds of dried milk for Europe's undernourished babies.

The vessel, sailing under the banner of the California Maritime Academy, will deliver its cargo, representing governmental contributions of more than \$150,000, to Greek and Italian ports for distribution by the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund (ICEF).

ICEF officials, who supervised the purchase of the milk, point out that the life-giving cargo is being carried free of charge, saving ICEF more than \$10,000, which will provide 300,000 meals for children.

Tar Heel Mules

A. B. Wood Dies At San Diego, Cal.

A. B. Wood, prominent in affairs in Cottage Grove for a number of years, but resident of San Diego for the past 20 years or more, died either January 22 or 23 at his San Diego home. The funeral was held January 29. The exact date of Mr. Wood's death was not known. He lived alone and when milk and newspapers had not been taken into the house for two days, an investigation was made. Mr. Wood was found almost fully dressed on a davenport and it was believed he had risen on the morning of January 22 and had suffered a heart attack while dressing.

Mr. Wood was for a number of years manager of the Oregon, Pacific and Eastern railway out of Cottage Grove, and he and associates once were associates in mining activities in the Bohemia district. He was an engineer and surveyor by profession and did considerable surveying in Oregon and Washington before removing to San Diego, where he also had done extensive surveying. Recently he had considerable land holdings in San Diego and surrounding country, but had liquidated a considerable amount of this due to his belief that the end was near. He was aged 87.

Hearing on Milk Prices Will Be Held in Eugene

A public hearing to consider revision of minimum prices paid producers for fluid milk and wholesale and retail prices to consumers in the Lane County Marketing Area will be held in Eugene, Oregon, in the County Court Room at 1:15 P.M., February 13, 1948, according to notices issued by the Milk Control Section, State Department of Agriculture.

Melvin J. Conklin, Examiner for the Department, is in charge of the hearing which is expected to establish official data for minimum milk and cream price schedules under conditions now prevailing in this area.

The Lane County hearing is one of a series being held by the State Department of Agriculture to investigate costs and other factors affecting the production and distribution of milk in the bottle and can trade.

DOUGLAS FIR BRINGS RECORD PRICE

Bidding the highest price ever offered for Douglas fir in Douglas county, the Robert Dollar Co. of Glendale purchased more than seven million board feet of timber of several species, for a total price of \$164,850.50 in a timber auction Friday conducted by the Umpqua National Forest.

The company's bid on Douglas fir was \$24.50 per thousand board feet, said M. M. Nelson, forest supervisor. The company bid appraised prices on other species of timber, including sugar pine, \$21.45; ponderosa pine, \$14.35; hemlock, \$4.35; incense cedar, \$4.35 and white fir, \$4.35. — Roseburg News Review.

The vote was 46 yes, and 25 no. A city charter was accepted by a vote of 74 yes, and 4 no. A meeting of the city council was held Thursday evening to start work on the bond issue. Maynard Wilson, of Cottage Grove, was present to give legal advice.

Kentucky Coffee

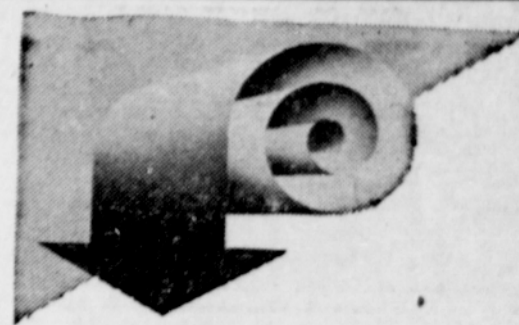
Kentucky coffee is secured from species of beans grown at a height that reaches a height of from 50 to 100 feet.
