COUNTY GETS \$139,817 TIMBER FUNDS

Lane County Saturday received \$139,817 as its portion of rentals and sales of timber in national forests during the previous fiscal year. The state total of \$938,870 represented 25 per cent of fees. Lane received the largest amount of the apportionment. Grant County received the second largest — \$80,515. The apportionment, made by the secretary of state, is based on receipts within each county. Lane County also received \$1559 as its share of 40 per cent of the state tax on amusement devices in the last three months of 1947.

I thought I'd pass along an idea to you for raising a few additional dollars for the Hospital Fund.

It is an idea that was used in Medford, and very successfully, for the March of Dimes Fund.

A call was made for local talent to travel around Jackson County putting on an amateur show for the public. Auditions were held at one of the hotels.

The troupe consisted of an amateur magician; accordion—single, duets, groups; electric guitars; an "old-time" fiddler; vocalists—including a novelty duet which has proved to be the most popular so far—and has practically "taken over the show" at every showing! Baton twirling was another of the acts; a drill team; and by far the sweetest of all, two little girls, aged 3 and 4 who tap-danced! (To me, they really "stole the show!") All-in-all, they had sixteen acts, which added up to a very entertaining and interesting two hour program.

The last night it was presented in the Medford High School auditorium and the school band took part. (Why couldn't a Glee Club be included, too?)

The admission was only fifty well-spent cents for adults and twenty-five of the same for children—with all the proceeds going to the March of Dimes. (In our case, the Hospital Fund.)

The group went to Ashland, Prospect, Central Point, Jacksonville, and many other outlying towns and communities where it was greeted enthusiastically and praised highly! (Even the standing room was filled in many of the towns!)

I know Cottage Grove could have just as much success with something like this. After all, we do have quite a large—and varied—collection of talent, young and old alike, in and around C. G. After all, who doesn't enjoy seeing friends or relatives "in action"!

Furthermore, most of the communities around Cottage Grove, Drain, Culp Creek, Loran, Creswell, —would turn out for it because of the cause. This hospital will benefit them all, and the sooner we can get it established and in action, the better for everyone! And from here on in, every dollar will count!

Hutton Returns to OSC for Full Time 4-H Club Work

In returning to Oregon State college as assistant state 4-H club leader, Burton Hutton, farm program director for radio KALE, is returning to full time work in an activity that he has been closely associated with ever since he was a club boy himself on a farm near Roseburg. His appointment, effective March 1, was announced recently by F. L. Ballard, acting director of the extension service, subject to final confirmation by the state board of higher education.

Throughout his professional career since graduating from Oregon State college in 1927, Hutton has been in positions where he was able to support and encourage 4-H club work. These positions include that of rural editor of the Pendleton East Oregonian and Corvallis Gazette Times, farm program director of the state radio station, KOAC; assistant director of the agricultural department of the Great Northern railroad, and for more than two years, his present position with KALE.

Appointment of Hutton brings to six the specialists in the state office and is in line with an announced policy of greater emphasis on that phase of extension work, Ballard said. The staff now consists of L. J. Allen, state leader; Hutton, Cal Monroe, Mrs. Winifred K. Gillen, Miss Esther Tasker and Mrs. Geraldine Danzi, assistant state leaders.

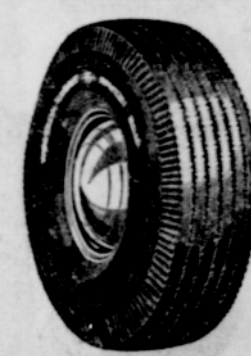
