UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, February 2 (Special) — The "biggest and best Dad's day ever" is in the offing for fathers of University of Oregon students on February 14 and 15, according to Dad's Day chairman, Arthur Johnson of Eugene and Beverly Pittman, Everett, Wash.

An extra large banquet for all fathers who attend the weekend is the highlight of plans as revealed by student chairman. The event will be held Saturday, Feb. 14. On Sunday dinners will be held at all campus living organizations.

Pennsylvania First

First tests in the United States for tuberculosis in cattle were made in Pennsylvania in 1892. State-wide testing was started in 1917 when approximately 10 per cent of all cattle were infected. Since then about 15 million tests have been made and infection has been reduced to less than 1 per cent.

Anti-Freeze of Salt Base Sort Terrible in Car

Lots of potential trouble and expense is riding around in the radiators of the nation's automobiles this winter in the form of salt anti-freeze solutions, which M. G. Huber, agricultural engineer at O. S. C. claims is a direct result of the scarcity and difficulty in obtaining suitable anti-freeze.

Huber says gyp firms have been cashing in by selling salt anti-freeze solutions under a variety of trade names. Samples of these have been received by the college for analysis. The common and only satisfactory anti-freezes, he states, are ethylene glycol and the alcohols.

Glycol anti-freeze, as most motorists know, has been next to impossible to buy. The available alcohol anti-freeze solutions are not entirely satisfactory since they evaporate readily at high driving temperatures. As a result, motorists have been tempted to try other types of anti-freeze. There is trouble ahead for the car owner who bought a salt base anti-freeze, Huber promises.

Most car owners have noticed the effect of the ocean on the family car when they took a vacation trip to the beach. Salt air and water speed nature's rust and corrosion process, Huber points out, and soon the automobile begins to show blemishes seldom seen back home. When motorists have used salt-base solutions some damage is already done, but the quicker the cooling system is drained and flushed the better.

"Any anti-freeze solution which is not definitely glycol or alcohol may be viewed with suspicion," Huber declares. "Salt solutions will cause radiator leaks as well as damage to all metal surfaces of the car engine."

Here are two simple rules for the motorist to follow as to insurance of his having recommended glycol or alcohol anti-freeze:

1. Glycol solutions come in sealed containers, generally under the trademark of reputable manufacturers. Wet the tip of a finger in a glycol; touch it to the tongue—it should taste sweet.

2. Alcohol solutions may be easily identified by their odor. Or, if a tablespoon full of the solution is poured on a flat surface and lighted with a match it will burn. Salt solutions will not burn, of course, and will give the familiar burning reaction in the mouth when tasted.

U. N. Center at U. Of O. Functioning

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, February 2 (Special) — The United Nations Information Center, a clearing-house of UN information in the form of a correspondence center, recently established at the University of Oregon school of education, now has a limited supply of pamphlets and other materials of interest to public school teachers and leaders of adult groups, according to the center's director, Dr. Hugh B. The center, which was established by the university in conjunction with the UN department of public information, serves a two-fold purpose: that of making the information more accessible to Oregon teachers, and relieving the volume of mail at the UN headquarters at Lake Success where replies are often delayed.

3 eggs 1/2 cup water
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 cup granulated sugar
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 cup all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon double-acting baking powder
(or 1 1/2 teaspoons single acting)
1/2 teaspoon salt Cream filling
Canned cling peach halves
Whipped cream
Combine egg yolks, water, rind and flavoring. Beat thoroughly with rotary beater. Gradually add sugar; beat after each addition. Blend in lemon juice. Stir in sifted dry ingredients; blend thoroughly. Fold in egg whites beaten until stiff, but not dry. Pour into 2 greased, waxed paper-lined, 8-inch layer cake pans. Bake in moderately slow oven (325 degrees F.) 35 to 40 minutes. Cool. Spread cream filling and diced peach halves between layers. Top with whipped cream and peach halves.
