Livestock Group To Study Future At Annual Meet

The present condition and outlook for animal disease control, with a special report on the threat of foot-and-mouth disease from Mexico, will form the basis of several program features at the eleventh annual meeting of the Western Oregon Livestock association in Roseburg February 13 and 14. Speakers in this field will include Dr. Charles F. Haynes, veterinarian; P. M. Brandt and Dr. J. N. Shaw of Oregon State college.

Activities of the convention will start at 9:30 Friday morning with the address of President Albert Julian, Lyons, according to the program just distributed by H. A. Lindgren, secretary and O.S.C. extension specialist. Others scheduled to speak are James Coon, Western Wool Storage Co.; G. H. Hansen, Fish and Wildlife Service, Portland; and R. L. Clark, president of the Pacific Wool Growers cooperative.

Committee meetings will start Friday afternoon, leading to the adoption of a program for the activities of the county associations in the coming year. Committee chairmen are, general resolutions, E. A. McDonald, Yoncalla; disease control, R. L. Jones, Clifton; legislative, Albert Powers, Coos Bay; transportation and marketing, Gene McKenzie, Coquille; predatory animal control, Jack Swanson, Lebanon; and range and pasture improvement, Hubert Wiloughby, Harrisburg.

The annual banquet will be in the Umpqua hotel Friday night with Burton Hutton, farm program director of radio KALE, Portland, as toastmaster, and Wallace Kaddery, farm program director of KGW, Portland, as speaker. Kaddery will report on livestock and range conditions in Australia and New Zealand as observed on his trip to those countries last year.

Saturday's program will include completion of committee work, presentation of committee reports and election of officers. Delegations from 12 western Oregon county livestock associations are expected to attend, and all interested are welcome.

Commodity Prices Continue to Skid

Major commodities continued a marathon price plunge in the principal commodity markets over the nation yesterday and a new grain crash at Chicago gave the trade its sharpest break and according to economics appears to have broken the back of the downward spiral. Wheat skidded the limit and closed at \$2.37 per bushel, 69¢ under the January 16 peak of the year.

Press dispatches say an index of 35 basic commodities fell from 207.74 a month ago to 187.76 yesterday. E. T. Maynard, veteran grain trader of Chicago is alleged to have made \$200,000 in the grain price skid yesterday.

The Wall Street Journal says federal economists are all set to administer artificial respiration if the price situation gets out of hand. Government propping is provided for 190 farm products. The present farm law pegs prices at 50 per cent of parity and is mandatory on 20 crops. If prices go below the floor the government must support them. The support price on wheat at Kansas City is \$2.03 per bushel. Agriculture experts are doubtful if prices will skid where they will require supports.

Here there has been a mark down on several items, but the price drops may not be felt for a week, ten days or possibly two weeks.

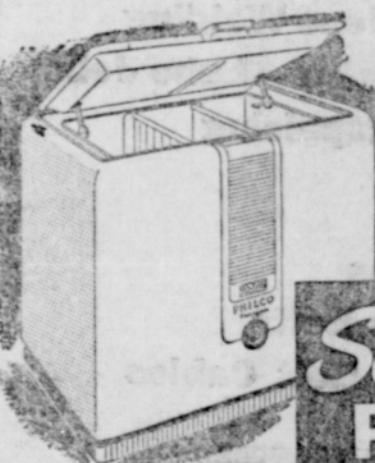
B - River Road

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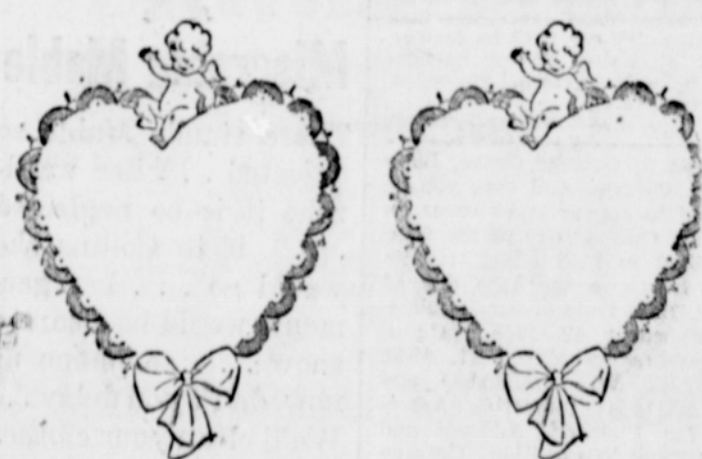
