Seed Certification Deadline for Willamette Vetch Set as Feb. 23rd

The Oregon State Seed Certification Board has set Monday, February 23, as the deadline for filing Lane County applications for certification of Willamette vetch. Lane county farmers who expect to have their crop certified this year are requested to call at the county agent's office and file their applications not later than the closing date.

Fletcher says that when growers call at the office to file their applications they should bring

with them the certification tags from the bags in which they purchased seed last fall and they should also have a record of crops grown on the land the last three years, that is in 1945, 1946, and 1947. No changes have been made in the field standards for blue tag certified vetch from those used for the 1947 crop.

The county agent states that in 1947 Willamette vetch was inspected for seed certification on 25 Lane county farms that had a total of 737 acres of this crop.

Lumber Output in Steady Upswing

Portland, February 12 — Shipments of Pacific Northwest lumber during January, 1948, topped those for January a year ago by more than 30,000,000 board feet, while production continued a steady upswing, H. V. Simpson, executive vice president of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association, announced today.

Total lumber shipments from the Douglas fir region of Oregon and Washington during the first four weeks of 1948 were 599,358,000 board feet, compared to 567,778,000 b.f. during a similar period in 1947, and 561,098,000 b.f. during the first four weeks of 1946, Simpson said.

Meanwhile the region's production rose in January to a weekly average of 154,647,000 b.f., an increase of 11.3% over that for January, 1947. Total January production was 618,589,000 b.f., compared to 555,657,000 for January, 1947, and 549,906,000 for January, 1946.

"This clearly shows that more and more lumber is getting out of the producing area and into the hands of builders and contractors who need it," Simpson said. "The industry's log inventory is high, and it is probable that equally substantial shipments will continue to be made in months to come."

Orders also showed an increase, the weekly average during January being 158,612,000 b.f., up 25,729,000 b.f. from the weekly average for December, 1947, and up 779,000 b.f. from January a year ago. Total orders, first four weeks, 1948, 634,448,000 b.f.; four weeks, 1947, 631,330,000; four weeks, 1946, 561,098,000.

Orders for four weeks of 1948 break down as follows: Rail, 430,273,000 b.f.; Domestic Cargo, 109,960,000 b.f.; Export, 30,263,000; Local, 63,952,000.

The industry's unfilled order file stood at 695,153,000 b.f. at the end of January, its gross stocks at 461,987,000 b.f.

Marketing Lighter Hogs Stretches Feed Supply

By marketing their hogs at just one pound lighter weight, hog men over the country could conserve about seven million bushels of grain, says Wisconsin College of Agriculture. Marketing hogs at lighter weights is one of the best ways to stretch the feed supply. Hogs marketed before they weigh 230-240 pounds usually require less feed to put on a pound of gain than hogs fed to heavier weight.

Schuster Death at OSC is Loss to The Nut Industry

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—In the death February 6 of Carl E. Schuster, federal horticulturalist stationed here, the Pacific northwest lost its most outstanding production specialist in the walnut and filbert industry, his colleagues here agree. His death at 58 followed only a week after a heart attack.

Schuster had been in the federal position since 1929 and for 10 years prior to that had been on the staff of the college. He was a graduate of O.S.C. with both bachelor and master degrees.

Active in nut growers' organizations, he served 20 years as secretary-treasurer of the Western Nut Growers association which made him an honorary life member. A commissioned officer in the first world war, he was since active in American Legion affairs, was elected to three honor societies in science and agriculture and was an official of the Evangelical United Brethren church. Mrs. Schuster and four children, three of them O.S.C. students, survive.
