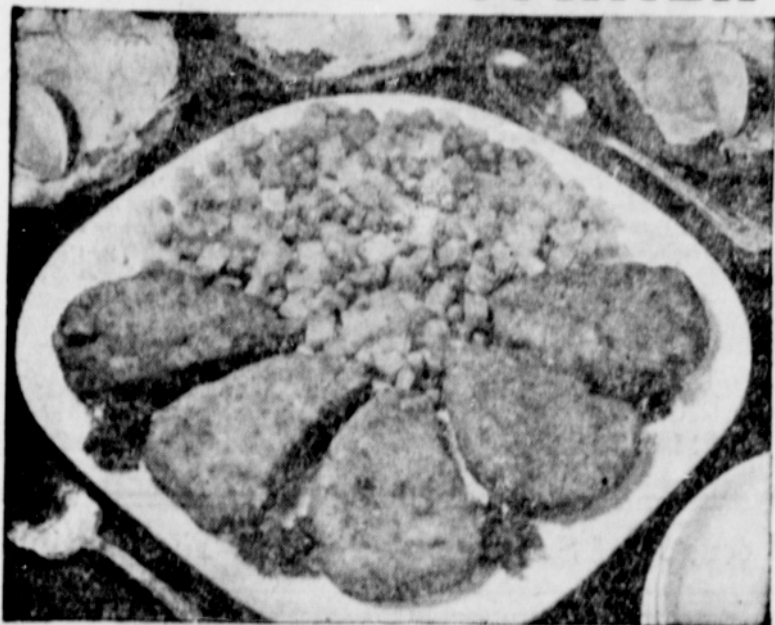

COOKERY CORNER.



Delightful for a main dish during Lent, or any other season for that matter, is this platter of egg cutlets, which have been fried to a delicious golden brown, accompanied by diced carrots and peas. Serve them plain or with a hot tomato sauce.

Right about this time, searching through recipe folders for Lenten dishes is a national pastime. Turn to the file marked "Eggs" and you will find a variety of recipes to save yourself time and effort. Also, save yourself pennies for eggs are easy on the pocketbook right now.

Everyone knows the usual

methods for preparing eggs, but why subject this versatile food to the monotony of constant poaching, scrambling and boiling? This is the time for bringing other egg recipes to light.

Let's see what different dishes we can find.

As a starter we suggest the Egg

Cutlets pictured on this page. Make them according to directions given below.

EGG CUTLETS

- 1 tablespoon shortening
- 1/4 cup diced onion
- 2 cups soft bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup milk
- 4 hard-cooked eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 1/2 teaspoon celery salt
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon minced parsley
- 1 pound shortening for deep fat frying

For dip:
1/2 cup milk
1 egg
1/4 cup sifted bread crumbs or cracker crumbs

Heat 1 tablespoon shortening. Cook onion slowly to a golden brown. Add bread crumbs and milk. Stir and cook slowly until thoroughly blended and thick (about 2 minutes). Add finely chopped eggs, poultry seasoning, salt, celery salt, and parsley. Spread on waxed paper or plate to cool. Shape into 5 cutlets. Chill. Heat 1 pound shortening slowly in deep kettle to 350 degrees. Fry about 2 minutes, or until a light golden color. Drain well over kettle, then place on tray covered with absorbent paper. Serve hot with tomato or mushroom sauce.

CURRIED BAKED EGGS

- 6 eggs
- 4 tablespoons butter
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons curry powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 4 cups milk
- 3 cups cooked rice
- 2 tablespoons fine bread crumbs

Melt butter in saucepan. Blend in flour, curry powder, and salt. Add milk slowly, stirring constantly. Cook until thickened and smooth. Pile cooked rice in greased 7 1/2 by 12-inch baking dish. Make 6 depressions in the surface of the rice. Break egg in each depression. Pour curry sauce over eggs and rice. Sprinkle with bread crumbs. Bake in a 350 degree oven 25 minutes or until eggs are set. The curried eggs may be prepared in individual casseroles.

A simple but effective way to serve eggs is to simmer halved hard-cooked eggs in a barbecue sauce for five minutes. These eggs can be served on buttered toast, fried noodles or rice. For a meal-in-one-dish, try them on top of a platter of cooked spinach surrounded by rice mounds. You'll like the color as well as the flavor.

Still another suggestion is "Egg Pie," a marvel at using odds and ends of cooked vegetables usually found in the refrigerator. Sliced hard-cooked eggs are added to medium cream sauce, together with mushrooms, cooked vegetables, and seasonings such as onion, salt and Worcestershire sauce. Placed in a casserole the creamed mixture can be topped with a pastry crust or mashed potatoes.

1948 Pontiacs Being Displayed

"The Hydra-Matic transmission has behind it years of manufacture and millions of miles of use at the hands of hundreds of thousands of motorists under all conditions," Klingler pointed out. "It was adopted by Pontiac only after we were completely assured of its dependability and permanent place in modern motoring. It is the same transmission now in use on General Motors' most expensive and luxurious line of motor cars, and will be available on all Pontiac models as optional equipment. Dealer surveys of their order lists revealed a strong pre-announcement demand for Hydra-Matic from persons awaiting delivery of new Pontiacs and we hope to be able to supply this demand."

OSC CANNERS SCHOOL BIG SUCCESS

The twenty-seventh annual two-week school for commercial canners and frozen food packers held at O.S.C. in February revealed increasing interest in this distinctive project of the food technology department. The school drew 200 persons including plant owners,
