THE PURPOSE OF BAPTISM

If you will carefully examine the Scriptures you will see that this theory is not the teaching of the Bible. Make this test: In every Scripture where you find one or more persons being baptized into Christ, notice to see if they are spoken of as having first been saved or having their sins already taken away. The usual teaching is in this order: Faith, Salvation, Baptism. The Bible order is Faith, Baptism, then Salvation. Jesus said: "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." Mark 16:16. Men should stop changing the Lord's arrangement.

The following Scriptures show what is accomplished in baptism:

Your sins are washed away. Acts 22:16.
You are saved from sin. I Pet. 3:21; Mark 16:16.
You receive remission of sins. Acts 2:38.
It puts you "into Christ". Gal. 3:27.
You begin walking a new life. Rom. 6:4.

If you have been baptized because you thought that you were already saved, you have not been Scripturally baptized. You must be baptized, as Jesus said, in order to be saved—not because you have already been saved.

Ban American Comics
Authors, journalists and educators of New South Wales have asked their government to ban all comic strips from the United States and to impose severe restrictions on importation of short stories and articles. A deputition claimed that use of imported features was a serious drain on dollars and that newspapers were using this material in preference to local items at a time when Australian journalists were seriously affected by newspaper cuts.

Infra-Red Ray for Cotton.

The newest wrinkle in cotton ginning is the use of infra-red rays to dry moist cotton. The idea is to keep a constant heat all through the ginning process. The cotton is heated while going through the extractor and stands. A battery of 32 infra-red lights is set up on each unit. By the time the cotton passes through the press there is little moisture left.

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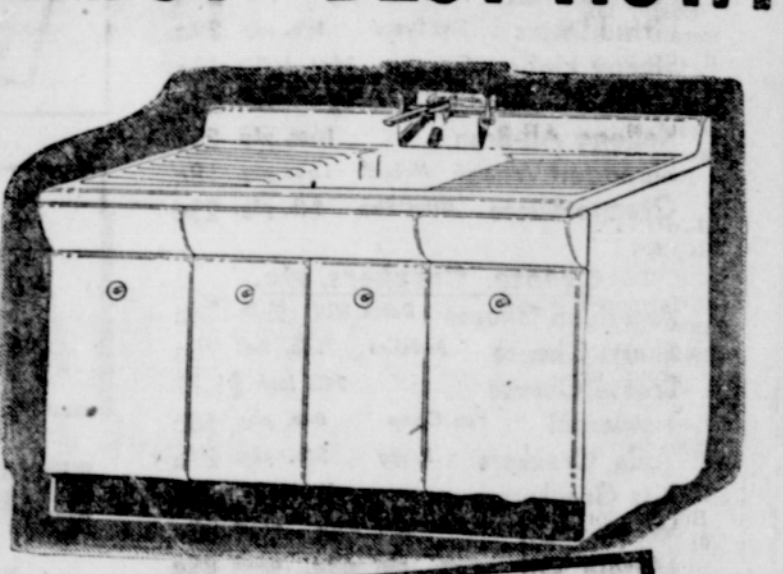
