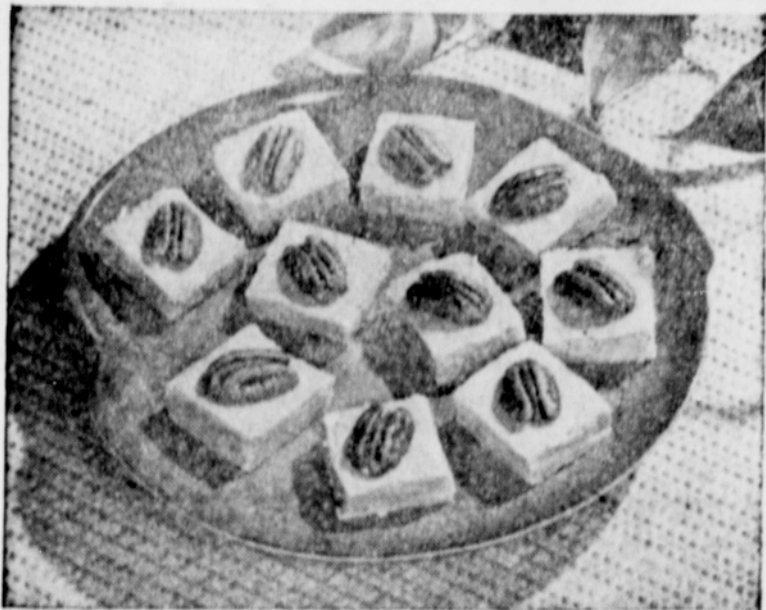

COOKERY CORNER



What a pleasant surprise and treat it is for the family to have a plate of homemade candy set out in the evening. You'll find it will strike just the right note with everyone, especially if the candy is creamy fudge flavored with fresh orange juice.

The search for "something different" enters all phases of cookery. We find, yes, even to the making of candy.

There's no denying the popularity of chocolate fudge or divinity but home-kitchen candy makers

like to experiment just as much as cake and cookie bakers.

With this in mind we scoured our files for unusual but good candy recipes and the results of our search are given below.

Our first choice features the ever popular orange. Just a touch

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of the juice and rind of this flavorful fruit effects the captivating flavor and delightful color of this creamy satiny-smooth fudge.

ORANGE CREAMS

1 tablespoon butter
1/2 cup evaporated milk
2 cups sugar
1 tablespoon orange juice
1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind
Melt the butter in the pan in which the candy is to be cooked. Add milk and sugar and boil to soft ball stage (235 degrees), stirring constantly. Cool, then stir in orange juice and rind. Beat until crystalline and turn into a buttered pan. Cut in squares. Note: Chopped nuts or shredded coconut may be added to candy before beating, if desired. Or pecan halves may be pressed into the top of each square.

RAISIN-FIG CHEWS

1/2 pound dried figs
1/2 pound raisins, seeded or seedless
1 cup bran
1/2 teaspoon salt
Put figs, raisins and bran through food chopper. Add salt. Form into balls and roll in powdered sugar if desired. Store in tightly covered jar.

PIZZAZZA

1 cup sugar, caramelized
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon soda
2 cups sugar
1 cup nuts
1 teaspoon vanilla

Heat milk, add soda and while foaming add to caramelized sugar, which should be in a deep saucepan. Stir occasionally to mix. Then add remaining sugar and butter. Cook to the hard ball stage (245 degrees), remove from fire and beat until creamy. Add nuts and flavoring. Pour onto buttered platter and cut when partly cold.

MARSHMALLOW CRISPS

1/2 cup butter or margarine
1/2 pound marshmallows (about 2 1/2 dozen)
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 ounce package crisp rice cereal

Cook butter and marshmallows over hot water until thick and syrupy. Add vanilla. Beat thoroughly. Put cereal in large greased bowl and pour in marshmallow mixture, stirring briskly. Press into greased shallow pan. Cut into desired shapes when cool.

SPICED NUTS

1 cup sugar
1/2 cup water
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon ginger
1 cup nuts

Cook all ingredients but the nuts to the soft ball stage (235 deg.). Add nuts and heat over slow fire, stirring gently until mixture granulates. Put on greased cookie sheet to cool, separating nuts.

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Navy Mechanical
Calculator Used
Guide Missiles

A new automatic calculating machine, capable of solving in one second a multiplication problem running into the millions, is being set up at the Naval Proving Ground, Dahlgren, Virginia.

Among the principal Naval uses of this 25-ton machine, known as the Aiken Relay Calculator, will be to produce range tables for new design missiles and to make computations in connection with guided missiles for the Navy's Bureau of Ordnance. The machine will also be available for similar use by other services.

It is expected that the computations involved in the prediction of the various characteristics of a guided missile from observational data will form a major part of the workload of the machine.

A structure has been built to house the massive machinery which fills a room 50 by 80 feet. It is expected that the work of reassembly will not be completed before next July. The machine is made of steel and bakelite, and contains more than a million feet of electrical wiring.

The Navy's Bureau of Ordnance purchased the Aiken Relay Calculator at a cost of approximately \$600,000. When the calculator is installed and operating, the Navy will have its first computer center.

Four sequence mechanisms will allow the calculator to handle pass-on or transfer numbers at the rate of 60 numbers a second. Addition of numbers running into the billions can be done in less than one-fifth of a second.

The machine is built to operate 24 hours a day. Any breakdown of the mechanism is signalled to the operator immediately by a complex alarm and light system installed in all parts of the machine. Each part is installed by a plug-in system, so faulty parts may be replaced without disturbing other parts.

For simpler mathematical work, the machine can be "broken" in two, with both parts doing separate calculations at the same time. As the machine solves the problems, the answers are automatically recorded by specially adapted teletype machines. Problems are put into the machine by punching paper tape which feeds the calculator its "instructions".

Once the computing center at Dahlgren is functioning, the Bureau of Ordnance intends to operate it at full capacity. As the machine is a general purpose type it will be of use in the solution of general scientific problems which would not be economical to compute by hand because of the time required and the complexity of the problem involved.
