AMERICAN MOVIES TO BRITAIN AGAIN

Motion picture producers of the United States and the British government reached a four-year agreement under which Britain will revoke its 75% tax on earnings of American films in Britain. In turn, the U. S. producers will resume shipments of motion pictures to England. The pact is effective Next June 14. It provides that the American movie industry may take home \$17 million yearly from its profits on films shown in Britain. In addition, yearly withdrawals may be increased by an amount equal to the earnings of British movies exhibited in the U. S. This will total about \$10 million annually.

Plow Under Cornstalks
Plow under those cornstalks. Is the advice of soil experts. Like other crop residues, cornstalks are important in helping rebuild organic matter. A ton of cornstalks is estimated to be as effective as three-quarters of a ton of fresh manure for organic matter. Cornstalks also are a source of nitrogen, phosphorus and potash. Returning crop residues should be a part of every good soil management plan. Liming and use of fertilizer are other vital practices.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON
Eugene, March 11 (Special)—The University of Oregon will be host to high school international relations leagues from all over the state April 9 and 10 when a state conference of Oregon high school students on international relations is held on the campus. Plants That Swim

Despite the fact they are plants, and not animals, many species of water algae are able to move about by swimming.
