COOKERY CORNER



Baked ham with yams is the number one choice for the main item of the Easter dinner menu so let's not buck tradition but plan to serve this regal fare next week. Suggestions for baking, glazing and decorating the Easter ham are given elsewhere on this page.

Gala ham for Easter. That's what we all look forward to at this time of the year and rightly so, for ham is truly a favorite meat and so easy to prepare.

First, select a ham of assured quality and sizeable enough to allow for second helpings with prized leftovers for use at breakfasts, lunches or dinners.

In baking a ham, the wisest course is to follow the directions on the tag attached to the ham. The modern hams are extra tender and fine flavored so follow the suggestion to bake fat side up on a rack in an open pan. No water, of course. Use a 325 degree oven to keep the juices in the ham and to get maximum tenderness. The baking time will be from 3 to 4 1/2 hours dependent on the size of the ham. Skin, score the fat in diamond shapes, cover with glaze and bake in a hot oven to brown. As easy as that!

The glaze, or flavorful topping which is added to the ham after it has been thoroughly cooked, is a very important part. You can choose from a wide variety to suit yourself. A brown sugar glaze is preferred by many. For this, a mixture of 1 cup brown sugar and 2 tablespoons flour is used. Other suggested glazes include (1) 1 cup white sugar and 2 tablespoons flour, (2) 1 cup honey or 1/2 cup orange marmalade, (3) 1 cup brown sugar and 1 tablespoon mustard, (4) 1 cup pureed apple sauce, apricots or other fruit, (5) 1 cup sugar and 1/2 cup marshmallow cherry juice, cider, or juice from pickled fruit, or (6) 1 cup sugar and 1 teaspoon grated orange rind. After the glaze has been spread over the ham, return it to a 400 degree oven for 15 minutes or until brown.

Decorations may seem superfluous and just that much extra work but they do add to the festive air of the occasion. A nice touch if there are children to enjoy your efforts is made by decorating hard-cooked eggs with flowers or lettered names of the family. These egg eggs may be served in nests of parsley.

Edible lilies are easily made too. Cut raw white turnips into very thin crosswise slices. Fold edge of one slice together at the bottom. Insert a small strip of raw carrot for the stamen. Wrap a second slice of turnip over open side and secure at the bottom with a toothpick. Crisp in ice water before serving.

The baked yams that are so well suited to ham are also easily prepared. Allow one large or two small per serving and wash well. Place in a shallow baking dish and bake along with the ham for about 1 hour. Open and serve in the shell with a bit of butter. You will find that the yams make their own syrup. Another way to prepare them is to boil them until just tender in their skins; peel and arrange in a shallow baking dish. Pour over a small amount of maple syrup and place in the oven until heated through.

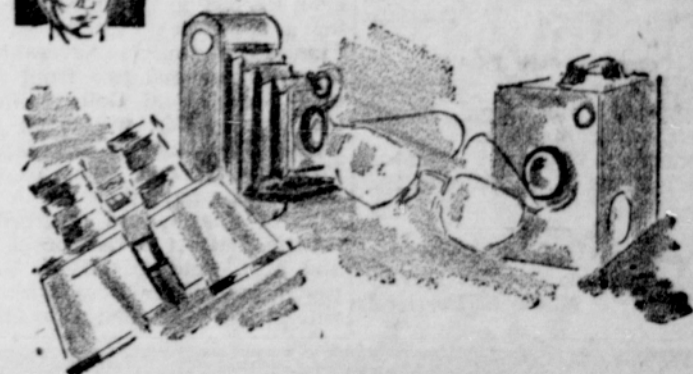
