Spring Outlook Good on Grains California Poor

Variable production and market prospects for Oregon's spring-planted annual crops are indicated in an agricultural outlook circular just released by the U. S. C. Extension Service. This report summarizes timely economic information on wheat, feed grains, hay, potatoes, vegetables, flax for seed and fiber, dry peas, and sugar beets.

The report includes several charts and tables illustrating trends and conditions. It was prepared by L. R. Briethaupt and M. D. Thomas, O.S.C. extension economists. Copies are available, free, from county agricultural agents or the college.

Currently, world bread grain

crop prospects are far more favorable than last fall. In the Pacific Northwest wheat crop prospects are unusually good in contrast to the poor condition in California, an important domestic market for Oregon wheat. Ordinarily, much malting barley is produced in California, but prospects are very poor this year, due to moisture shortage. Corn production in this country will probably be substantially larger than the very poor crop of 1947, unless the weather is again unusually adverse. The size of the corn crop and the amount of wheat exported are expected to have considerable influence on cereal prices.

The 1948 potato and onion crops in this country are expected to be larger than last year. Actual market conditions for these and other truck crops will depend greatly upon the supply of individual kinds and the duration of the present high level of consumer demand. These factors are discussed in the six-page circular.

A substantial acreage of flaxseed is likely to be planted this year. The government will support prices again, as in 1947. Last year yields were better than average, and most Oregon growers were satisfied with this crop. Fiber flax acreage was down last year and imports increased.

11 Year Summary Of Oregon Taxes Issued by OSC

Detailed figures on property tax trends in Oregon from 1937 to 1947 are now available with the publication by the agricultural experiment station at Oregon State college of the second in a series of two bulletins on "Public Expenditures in Oregon."

This 100-page bulletin, like the first, is the result of studies made by Dr. W. H. Dreeson, agricultural economist of the station, retired, who has listed the expenditures by spending units and major functions as measured by tax levies imposed upon general property. It covers the year 1935 through 1947, while the other dealt with the period 1910 through 1934. Copies are available free.

The effect of increased income tax revenue is shown in the new study. Receipts from this source plus collection of delinquent taxes served to permit a slightly downward tendency in total rural and urban tax levies during the 11-year period despite increased public expenditures.

From the close of the tax year 1935 to August 1947 delinquent taxes were reduced from a high peak of \$46,510,000 to \$11,770,000. Thus collection of back taxes amounted to \$34,740,000 for the period.

Income tax receipts wiped out all state property levies during the 11-year period except for 2.83 mills in 1935, 1.16 mills in 1936 and .34 mill in 1939, Dr. Dreeson reports.

Total property tax levies varied considerably in different regions of the state for the period. For rural taxable property the total levies calculated on an equalized valuation averaged 44.15 mills for the coast counties, 29.85 for the Willamette valley, 28.65 for southern Oregon and 25.30 for eastern Oregon, with the state average being 20.34 mills.

For urban taxable property the total levies calculated on the same equalized valuation basis averaged 71.95 mills for coast counties, 56.65 for southern Oregon, 55.72 for eastern Oregon, 50.51 in Multnomah county, 48.95 in the Willamette valley, and 51.96 for all cities in the state.
