The group won the class "B" Hayward Relay and the Greater Willamette Valley meet, third place in the District 4 meet and first in the Tri-County meet. Four were in the state meet and placed sixth.

This year's team will miss Roy Duerst, Don Nichols, and Ralph Long but still have Les Porter and Vernon Coop in the high jump and Spaid and Ben Campbell in the sprints, and the Hite twins look mighty good out there also. Ken Harker is also a sprint man. Wes Thompson will run the 330 and Mike Gamble the 880.

Two more lettermen from last year's team are Leo Hawkins and Harold Godard who ran the mile last year. Leo says he will run the mile between 4:30 and 4:45.

Two more brothers on the team are Milo and Ronald Chapman. They pole vault and run the hurdles. Ronald will not be able to pole vault for about a month, for he is still nursing an injured shoulder from basketball.

In the weights there are Bruce Johnson and Bob Gasper on the javelin. The lone shot man is Cecil Woods.
