Better Weather To Start Rush Of Garden Work

The neatest April Fool's Day trick the weather man could play on Oregon vegetable gardeners would be to give them a few days of sunshine in order that they might plant their gardens states R. Ralph Clark, O.S.C. extension horticulturist.

Thus far, it has been a particularly poor spring for gardening, Clark declares, commenting on the fact that the season in western Oregon is slower than usual. Rains have been the disturbing factor in many gardening plans.

Early April is the time to get the main family garden planted, Clark advises. He says if no other good has come from the lateness of the season, there is lots of soil moisture assured. Changing weather could bring garden planting conditions quickly. Since growing conditions have been relatively poor for early gardens, Clark predicts that gardens planted now will almost catch up with the earlier seedings.

The season is here for planting such table and processing vegetables as peas, beets, carrots, onions, chard, spinach, lettuce, cabbage, cauliflower, bush beans and early corn.

With planting will come the early garden pests. Clark says gardeners may expect to see cutworms, slugs, and aphids during the next few weeks. Poisoned bait is the best control measure for the cutworms and slugs. Aphids are generally controlled by nicotine sprays or dusts.

Oregon county agents have indicated there is considerable interest in home vegetable gardens this year, Clark states. A good many persons, the horticulturist says, are interested in helping the family budget along by growing some of their own food items.

STUDENTS IN NINE NATIONS TO GET 52 FELLOWSHIPS

PARIS—Fifty-two students and research workers from nine war-devastated nations will study outside their own countries this year under an international fellowship program set up by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (Unesco) here.

The fellowships, entirely financed by Unesco, will last for six months and will be in such fields as radio education, educational problems of war-affected children, libraries, art and music teaching and educational administration.

Forty-eight of the fellowships are directly linked with educational reconstruction and will go to candidates in China, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Greece, Denmark, The Netherlands, Norway and the Philippine Republic. In addition, two Chinese and two Indian candidates will be awarded fellowships to study mathematical computing machines.
