DEMOCRATS HOLD LEAD IN MULTNOMAH REGISTRATION

Multnomah County Democrats still held lead in voter registration as the qualifying deadline neared Monday for the May 21 primary balloting.

County Registrar James W. Gleason reported Monday Democrats totaled 104,363 and Republicans 96,964. All party affiliations totaled 204,459 as of Saturday. The registration books closed Tuesday evening.

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
