COOKERY CORNER



Well known at breakfast, cereal has plenty to say when it comes to dessert! Outstanding example of this is the Orange Custard pictured, with a crunchy topping of cereal that makes it different from all other puddings.

CEREAL CRUNCH ORANGE PUDDING

- 2 cups milk
- 1 tablespoon grated orange rind
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 3 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 cup wheat flakes

Inexpensive cereal has a way of showing up in unlikely places on the menu and proving itself a boon to the thrifty-minded.

One of these places is in dessert and to prove our point we offer an interesting assortment of cereal recipes and ideas.

First on the list is the custard pudding pictured on this page. Breakfast cereal does the dress-up work for this otherwise plain Jane of the dessert family.

Scald milk with 2 teaspoons orange rind in top of double boiler. Mix together flour, sugar and salt; add milk gradually, stirring constantly. Return to double boiler and cook, stirring constantly until mixture thickens, cover and cook 10 minutes longer. Beat eggs, gradually add thickened mixture and cook 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Chill. Melt butter, blend in brown sugar and remaining orange rind. Cook until thick and smooth, stirring constantly. Blend in cereal. Cook and stir 5 minutes. Spread thin on baking sheet to cool. Crumble over top of chilled custard which has been poured into serving bowl. Garnish with orange slices if desired. Serves 6.

DATE ICE BOX PUDDING

- 3 cups bran flakes
- 1 cup corn flakes
- Dash of salt
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon grated orange rind
- 1 cup finely cut dates
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup nuts

Crush cereal flakes; set aside 1/2 cup. To remaining crumbs, add salt, sugar, rind, dates, and nuts; then add milk and mix. Place mixture on waxed paper and shape into roll about 8 inches long. Sprinkle outside with 1/2 cup cereal flakes. Wrap in waxed paper and chill 5 to 6 hours or until firm. Cut into slices; top with whipped cream. Serves 8.

SPICED CEREAL SURPRISE

- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups milk
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup wheat flakes
- 1/4 teaspoon each cinnamon and nutmeg

Beat eggs slightly, stir in sugar and salt. Scald milk and add slowly to egg mixture. Add vanilla. Pour into greased casserole. Sprinkle cereal, cinnamon and nutmeg on top. Set casserole in pan of hot water and bake in a 350 degree oven about 40 minutes or until knife inserted in center comes out clean. Serve hot or cold. Serves 6.

NUT CRUNCH

- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 3 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 cup wheat flakes
- 1/4 cup chopped nuts

Melt butter, blend in brown sugar. Cook until thick and smooth, stirring constantly. Blend in cereal and nuts. Cook and stir 5 minutes. Then spread in thin layer on a baking sheet. Crumble when cool. Crumble this cereal crunch and sprinkle it on cream pies. Use it as a base for molded puddings or baked custards. Try it to dress up a dish of fresh or cooked fruit such as peaches, baked apples or pears. Store in a covered glass jar.

Research Vital In Solution of Stream Pollution

Urgent need for extensive research in treatment of waste from food processing plants and other industries in Oregon is expressed in a new bulletin of the engineering experiment station at Oregon State college entitled "Industrial and City Wastes."

This bulletin, written by Fred Merryfield, professor of sanitary engineering; W. B. Bollen, associate bacteriologist of the agricultural experiment station, and F. C. Kachelhoffer, instructor in sanitary engineering, amplifies data on municipal and industrial wastes presented in an earlier bulletin No. 19. The latter reported on early stages of the study authorized by the Oregon State Sanitary authority July 5, 1945.

Methods of handling the growing volume of industrial wastes are as important as methods for handling ordinary city sewage in any program of controlling stream pollution, the authors point out. Only scattered research, mostly on an individual basis, has been attempted on food processing wastes, though extensive research is now in progress on extensive waste from pulp and paper industries.

"It is more than likely that with adequate research many present wastes could be transformed into useful and profitable by-products," the authors conclude. "Pilot plant operation over two or three years in the treatment of such wastes is urgently needed."

Outstanding cooperation by municipalities and some 14 representative industries was extended to those conducting the study. Curtis M. Everts, Jr., state sanitary engineer, in an introduction to the bulletin, says the cooperation extended in determining the magnitude of the problem promises equal cooperation in seeking a satisfactory solution.

Much of the bulletin is devoted to detailed tables showing the quantity and analysis of industrial and municipal wastes from many parts of the state. The authors dedicate the bulletin to "the city crews and others who worked long and weary hours" gathering samples around the clock for use in the study. Copies may be had from S. H. Graf, director of the engineering experiment station, Corvallis, Oregon.

Chevrolet to Pace Indianapolis Race

In making the announcement, T. H. Keating, general sales manager of Chevrolet, also disclosed two added first place race awards. The winner will be given the pace car, a dove grey Chevrolet cabriolet, and an especially designed, 40-inch high Chevrolet trophy.

Keating said that the car which leads the field of 33 drivers across the starting line will be strictly stock.

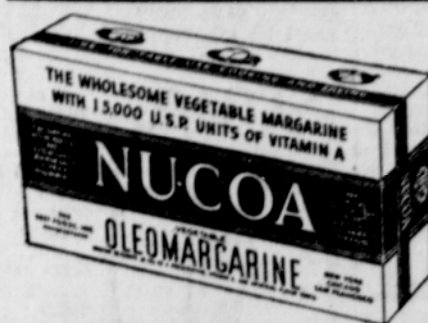
