Market Guide to Farm Forestry In Oregon Ready

The first published forest products market guide designed to aid Oregon farmers in marketing their own logs, poles, fuel wood and pulpwood has just been issued as a 70-page mimeographed bulletin entitled "Marketing Farm Forest Products—Western Oregon."

Issued as O.S.C. School of Forestry circular No. 1, the bulletin is published cooperatively by the O.S.C. extension service, the school of forestry, the forest service of the U.S.D.A., and the Oregon state board of forestry.

As the material presented pertains largely to western Oregon counties, the information is also available in three smaller sub-circulars, one covering Lane, Douglas and Coos counties; another the central Willamette valley counties and the third north-west Oregon counties and Portland. Copies are available free from extension offices in the area and from forest service and state forest offices as well as direct from the school of forestry at Corvallis.

"Nearly two-thirds of the 10 million acres of private forest land in Oregon is owned by farmers and other small holders," authors of the circulars point out. "Thus the productivity of the major portion of Oregon's timberlands depends upon the treatment it receives from the farmers."

The circulars include price quotations which are admittedly subject to frequent changes, though the relationships and specifications pertaining to the various products are usually applicable to longer time. Plans are to issue additional circulars or supplements to these as changed conditions warrant, according to Paul M. Dunn, dean of the school of forestry.

Oregon now has one extension forester and two farm foresters assigned to specific districts to give professional forestry assistance to farmers whose holdings are too small to warrant hiring a private forest consultant. Where high values are involved, the employment of a private consultant is recommended as being highly profitable.
