SPECIAL ELECTION NOTICE FOR CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, OREGON, MAY 21, 1948

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN: That a special election will be held in the City of Cottage Grove, Oregon, on Friday, the 21st day of May, 1948, from the hour of 8 o'clock in the forenoon to the hour of 8 o'clock in the afternoon, and at said election the following Charter Amendments will be submitted to the electors of said city for their approval or rejection, to-wit:

"An Act to Amend the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove, Lane County, Oregon, by adding a new chapter thereto authorizing and empowering the Common Council of the City to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City in the amount of Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose of purchasing, acquiring, establishing, constructing, equipping and improving a municipal airport for the City of Cottage Grove, Lane County, Oregon", initiated by petition of the electors of said city and referred to the electors by the Common Council for their approval or rejection. Also

"An Act to Amend the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove, Lane County, Oregon by adding a new chapter thereto (which will take effect July 1, 1948) abolishing the office of the City Manager and the office of Municipal Judge and restoring unto the Mayor, City Recorder and Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove, certain powers and duties and fixing the duties and powers of the Mayor, City Recorder and Common Council: Making the office of the City Recorder an elective office and repealing all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," initiated by petition of the electors of said city and referred to the electors by the Common Council for their approval

or rejection. The judges and clerks of election and voting places in each ward shall be the same as in the precincts in each of the wards of said city at the general primary election to be held on said date, all as provided by Ordinances No. 1295 and 1296, passed by the Common Council and approved by the Mayor on April the 26th, 1948.

The following are the Charter Amendments to be voted on:

CHARTER AMENDMENT
AN ACT TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, LANE COUNTY, OREGON, BY ADDING A NEW CHAPTER THERETO AUTHORIZING AND EMPOWERING THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY TO ISSUE AND SELL NEGOTIABLE BONDS OF THE CITY IN THE AMOUNT OF EIGHTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$18,000.00), OR SO MUCH THEREOF AS MAY BE NECESSARY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PURCHASING, ACQUIRING, ESTABLISHING, CONSTRUCTING, EQUIPPING AND IMPROVING A MUNICIPAL AIRPORT FOR THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, LANE COUNTY, OREGON.

THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, OREGON, ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, LANE COUNTY, OREGON:

Section 1: That the Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City in the amount of Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose of purchasing, acquiring, establishing, constructing, equipping and improving a Municipal Airport for the City of Cottage Grove, Lane County, Oregon.

Section 2: That the bonds hereby authorized shall be denominated

"Cottage Grove Airport Bonds". They shall be a general obligation of the City of Cottage Grove and shall be in denominations of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), or One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) each, or both, or in multiples thereof in the discretion of the Common Council of Cottage Grove, Oregon. The first installment of the principal shall fall due and be payable not later than one (1) year after date, and the last installment not later than ten (10) years from date of issue, and the installments of principal shall either be equal or substantially equal in amount, or the combined installments of principal and interest due in any year, shall be, as nearly as practicable, in such sums as will permit of an equal annual tax levy for the retirement of the principal of and the payment of the interest on said bonds. Said bonds shall be made due and payable ten (10) years from date of their issue and bear interest at the rate of not to exceed five percent (5%) per annum, interest payable semi-annually; the City of Cottage Grove to reserve the right to retire any or all of said bonds on and after five (5) years from date thereof in accordance with the provisions of Section 97-101 O.C.L.A. and all acts amendatory thereto.

Section 3: The Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove is hereby authorized to include in its general tax levy sufficient special levy to pay the interest on the bonds and provide a sinking fund for the amounts due.

Section 4: The Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove is hereby authorized to issue and sell the said bonds from time to time as they may be necessary for the purpose herein specified, but before any of the bonds shall be sold they shall be advertised for sale by publication of a notice asking for bids therefor, to be published in a newspaper in Cottage Grove, Oregon, once a week for two successive and consecutive weeks prior to the date of the sale, and they shall also give notice of the sale of said bonds in such other papers as they may deem to be best for the interests of the City in effecting a sale, and if no satisfactory bids for the purchase of the bonds be received, they may sell them at private sale at not less than par and accrued interest.

Section 5: The indebtedness authorized by this Amendment to the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove is in addition to all other indebtedness authorized and incurred by the City of Cottage Grove, and shall not be considered as affected by any limitation of the indebtedness in the Charter of the City, or elsewhere.

Section 6: The funds arising from the sale and disposal of all bonds provided for in this act shall be known as "Cottage Grove Airport Bonds", and shall be kept separate and apart from all other funds of the City of Cottage Grove and shall only be used to pay the costs and expenses that may be incurred by the City of Cottage Grove in purchasing, acquiring, establishing, constructing, equipping and improving a Municipal Airport for the City of Cottage Grove, Lane County, Oregon.

CHARTER AMENDMENT
AN ACT TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, LANE COUNTY, OREGON BY ADDING A NEW CHAPTER THERETO (WHICH WILL TAKE EFFECT JULY 1, 1948) ABOLISHING THE OFFICE OF CITY MANAGER AND THE OFFICE OF MUNICIPAL JUDGE AND RESTORING UNTO THE MAYOR, CITY RECORDER AND COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, LANE COUNTY, OREGON, CERTAIN POWERS AND DUTIES AND FIXING THE DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE MAYOR, CITY RECORDER AND COMMON COUNCIL: MAKING THE OFFICE OF THE CITY RECORDER AN ELECTIVE OFFICE AND REPEALING ALL ACTS AND PARTS OF ACTS IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.

THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, OREGON, ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, LANE

COUNTY, OREGON:

Section 1. (a) That the office of City Manager be, and the same is hereby, abolished to take effect on July 1, 1948.

(b) That the office of Municipal Judge be, and the same is hereby, abolished to take effect on July 1, 1948.

(c) That all of the powers and duties of the City Manager are hereby restored to the Mayor, City Recorder and the Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove, to be vested in said officers in the manner hereinafter set forth and the powers and duties of the Municipal Judge are hereby vested in the City Recorder.

Section 2. The elective officers of said City shall be a Mayor, a Treasurer, a Recorder who shall be ex-officio Clerk of the Council, all of whom shall be residents and qualified voters of said City and shall hold office for the term of two years and until their successors are elected and qualified. Councilmen shall also be elected in the manner provided for in Chapter 2, Section 1, of the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove.

Section 3. The Mayor shall preside at all meetings of the Common Council, and when absent the Council shall select one of their own number to preside pro tem. He shall be chief executive of the city and conservator of the peace, and to that end he shall, in the absence of the City Recorder or his inability or failure to act, be the judicial officer of said city, and shall try all persons accused of violating city ordinances, and shall have jurisdiction over all violations of any ordinances of said city, and may hold to bail, fine or commit persons found guilty thereof, and shall have the power to administer oaths, and to punish witnesses and others for contempt, by fine, not to exceed \$25.00, and by imprisonment in the city jail one day for every \$2.00 of such fine. He shall be a citizen of the United States, a freeholder within said city, and a qualified voter at the time of his election and an inhabitant of the city for at least one year before the day of his election. He shall take care that the laws of the state and ordinances of the city are duly observed and enforced. It shall be his duty to keep his office in some convenient place in said city, to be provided by the Common Council; to see that all officers of the City faithfully comply with and discharge their official duties, and to that end maintain an action or mandamus or other appropriate action against any delinquent officer; he shall, from time to time, give the Common Council such information and recommend such measures as he may deem advantageous to the city. In the business meetings of the Council, the Mayor shall not vote on any questions except when the vote of the Council ties, when the Mayor shall cast the deciding vote. All ordinances and resolutions shall, before they take effect, be presented to the Mayor, and if he approves thereof he shall sign the same, and such as he shall not sign he shall return to the Common Council with his objections thereto, by depositing the same with the City Recorder, to be presented to the Common Council at their next regular meeting thereafter. Upon the return of any ordinance or resolution by the Mayor, the vote by which the same was passed shall be deemed to have been reconsidered, and the question shall again be put upon the passage of the same, notwithstanding the objections of the Mayor; and if upon such vote the Common Council shall pass the same by a majority vote of the members of the Council it shall have the same effect as if approved by the Mayor. If any ordinance or resolution shall not be returned to the City Recorder by the Mayor within five days, Sundays excepted, after it shall be presented to him the same shall have the same force and effect as if approved by the Mayor.

It shall be the duty of the City Recorder to endorse upon each ordinance or resolution when such ordinance or resolution was delivered to the Mayor, and the time when the same shall be returned to his office by the Mayor. The Mayor shall have the power, when he deems it necessary, to appoint police officers, who shall act in conjunction with the Chief of Police; and in the absence of the Chief of Police the Mayor shall have the power to appoint a Deputy Chief of Police, who shall act and have the same powers as the Chief of Police until discharged by the Mayor. The compensation paid the deputy shall be the same as that paid the Chief of Police, and the amount so paid to said deputy shall be deducted from the salary of the Chief of Police.

Section 4. (a) The City Recorder shall be ex-officio Clerk of the Common Council, and as such shall keep the corporate seal and all the papers and records of the city, except as otherwise provided by this act, and keep a record of all the proceedings of the Common Council, at whose meetings it shall be his duty to attend. Copies of all papers filed in his office, and transcripts from the records of the Common Council, certified by him under the Corporate seal, shall be evidence in all courts the same as if the original were produced. He shall draw and sign all orders of the Treasurer in pursuance of any order or resolution of the Common Council, and keep a full and accurate account thereof in books provided for that purpose. Beetle Is Voracious Enemy of Potatoes Dusting or Spraying Will Control Menace

Ranking as the most serious threat to the grower of potatoes and other vegetables is the Colorado potato beetle, which is prevalent throughout many areas of the country.

The beetle is yellowish in color, stout bodied, about two-fifths of an inch in length and with wing covers bearing 10 longitudinal stripes. The larva or "slug" is soft-bodied, reddish in color and reaches a maximum size of about three-fifths of an inch in length. Late in June when the potato plants begin to appear above ground, the beetles



attack the foliage and lay their orange-colored eggs on the under side of the leaves.

The eggs hatch in a few days into voracious larvae which, after feeding for about 10 days, leave the plants and enter the soil to complete their development. They emerge as adult beetles by the latter part of July. A second brood is produced in August and adults of this generation winter in the soil. Both the larvae and adults are severe defoliators of the plants.

To rid the potatoes, tomatoes, egg plants, peppers, ground cherries and cabbage plants of the Colorado potato beetle, dust or spray with paris green, calcium arsenate or cryolite. Hand picking of the beetles and crushing of the egg masses is effective if done often.

Barn Cleaners



Barn cleaners should have all mechanical parts, of simple design, yet sturdy and easy to control. It is possible to thoroughly clean the average dairy barn by use of mechanical barn cleaners. A clean barn is the first requisite for clean and healthy cows. Installation of a mechanical cleaner, such as illustrated above, will do away with much of the drudgery of this farm operation.

Insects Launch Early Attack on Vegetables

With the first reasonably warm days, insects will make their advent. These will be the green worm and lice on cabbage and the Colorado beetles and black fleabeetles on potatoes.

The cabbage green worm comes shortly in the wake of the familiar white-and-yellow "butterflies" that go bobbing about, dropping eggs as they touch the leaves of the cabbage. This chewing insect is killed by poison; not one of the arsenates, however, but the safe insecticide, rotenone. The best way is dusting, with a strength of three-fourths of 1 per cent of rotenone, as most prepared dusts have. The first application should be made when the "butterflies" first come, then repeated once or twice ten days apart.

Sugar Beets Considered Good Crop for Dairymen

The sugar beet is an important cash crop, according to University of Wisconsin. Years of extensive production prove that the crop blends in well with dairy farming, makes good use of farm manure and leaves the soil loose and friable. Beets seldom are damaged by either late spring or early fall frosts. There are few crops that leave the soil in as good condition. The tops are very valuable feed for cattle and sheep. They may be pastured, partially cured and put into trench silos, or used as silage.

Evergreen Windbreak Protects Farmstead

When planning the layout for improving the farmstead include a good evergreen windbreak to provide protection from prevailing winds. Plant the windbreak back about 150 feet from the buildings that are to be protected. As for depth of the windbreak, one row is good, two rows better and three rows will give still more protection. Space the trees about 18 feet apart.

Bulbs Need Shades
Bare light bulbs cause glare, and should not be used without shades unless in little-used parts of the house.

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WHAT KIND OF A SERVANT ARE YOU?

"But God be thanked, that ye were the servants of sin, but ye have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered you. Being then made free from sin, ye became the servants of righteousness." Rom. 6:17,18. Every mentally responsible person is one of two kinds of servants. You are either serving sin or righteousness. In the scripture quoted above Paul was writing to people who had been servants of sin but had later become servants of righteousness. What had they done to make the change? He told them that they had obeyed a "form of doctrine". Earlier in the same chapter Paul mentioned the new life that they had begun to live. Again we ask: What did these folks do which started them on a new life and made them servants of righteousness? The answer is given in verses 3-5: "Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death? Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection." Thus we see that the "line" which marked the beginning of their new lives as servants of righteousness was their baptism into Christ. They were then "made free from sin" and became the "servants of righteousness". Before this act they were servants of sin. What kind of a servant are you?

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
