

LEGAL NOTICES

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of absence, sickness or inability of said Recorder to act as Clerk, the Common Council shall have the power to appoint a Recorder and Clerk pro tem, who shall have the authority, in the disability or absence of the Recorder, to perform all the duties of the Clerk of the Common Council, to certify and affix the corporate seal to copies and files or transcripts of records; and certificates so made by him shall have the same validity as if made by said Recorder, and his name of office, when acting as Clerk of the Common Council, shall be "Recorder and Ex-officio Clerk of the Common Council".

(b) The Recorder is authorized to administer oaths, and shall

have the jurisdiction over all violations of city ordinances, and shall have jurisdiction and powers over all violations of city ordinances, and shall have jurisdiction and powers like a Justice of the Peace, and his territorial jurisdiction shall extend to and be co-extensive with the limits and boundaries of the County of Lane, and the law governing a Justice of the Peace, so far as applicable, shall apply to all his proceedings. He shall try all persons accused of violating city ordinances, without a jury, unless the party defendant on demanding a jury shall deposit in court the sum of \$6.00, which sum shall be used as payment of the per diem of such jury for one day; and if the cause require more than one day, the defendant shall be required to deposit an additional \$6.00, for each day, in advance, before proceeding with the cause, and if he fails so to do, the jury

shall be discharged, and the cause proceed without a jury and before the Recorder as if no jury had been called; and the witnesses in such trials shall be entitled to no compensation for their attendance, unless the Council, by ordinance, shall otherwise direct; and the jury shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by ordinance of said city. The Recorder shall have the power, as such, to punish witnesses and others for contempt, by fine, by imprisonment, in the city jail one day for every \$2.00 of such fine imposed; keep a journal of all his proceedings and of the proceedings of the Council, and perform such other duties as the charter and the ordinances of the City may require.

Section 5. In addition to other powers and duties of the Council as set forth in the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove said Common Council shall have the following powers and duties:

1. The Common Council shall have the power to appoint the heads of all departments who are not elected officials, and to appoint all other City officers and employees and to have general supervision and control over them, except as otherwise provided in this charter.

2. The Common Council shall have the power to remove from office any officer appointed by said Council for good cause, upon a majority vote of the Councilmen. Any officer elected by the people may be removed for good cause by said Council upon a three-fourths vote of the Council. Continued absence from meetings and neglect of duty by any officer elected or appointed shall, unless for good reasons, be deemed good cause for removal; but no officer shall be removed unless first furnished with a copy of the charges for a period of five days before any procedure be had. The Common Council shall fix the time and place for the trial of such officer, of which, not less than five days notice shall be given him, and shall have the power to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of papers, and to hear and determine the case; and if such officer shall refuse or neglect to appear and answer such charge, the Common Council shall declare the office vacant.

3. The Mayor and the Common Council shall be the administrative heads of the City government and all the powers and duties heretofore vested in the City Manager are hereby delegated to the Mayor and the Common Council of said City.

4. To have control of all public utilities owned or operated by the City.

5. To have general supervision over all City property and its use by the public or city employees.

6. To see that the provisions of all franchises, leases, contracts, permits and privileges granted by the City are fully observed.

Section 6. The office of Municipal Judge is hereby abolished and all the duties and powers of said Municipal Judge are hereby vested in the City Recorder, acting as judicial officer of the City of Cottage Grove, and said powers and duties shall be those hereinbefore set forth.

Section 7. All provisions of the Charter and Charter Amendments of the City of Cottage Grove in conflict with the provisions of this Charter Amendment and enacted prior to the time this act takes effect are hereby repealed in so far as they conflict herewith.

Section 8. This Charter Amendment shall be in full force and effect on and after July 1, 1948.

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and the retention of an efficient and experienced Fire Chief, which is essential for training and supervising the volunteers, the city manager said. Also, after the first of July another paid fireman will be added to the force.

The budget also will allow for the continual development of the police department reorganization plan which was submitted to the City Council and approved last September. It will provide for uniform allowances and salaries sufficient to attract efficient men and obtain better equipment.

"This is necessary in small departments because there are no facilities for training policemen," Mr. Heinz said.

"If this new budget is adopted it will allow us to do a better job of street maintenance and repair," the city manager pointed out. "However the taxpayer must keep in mind that although city government like business is trying to approach pre-war standards in giving better service, it is difficult with high costs. Furthermore, due to the fact that the city has grown and services have increased, a heavier burden is placed on administering affairs."

In addition, the city is forced to budget for inspection due to the passing of electrical and plumbing ordinances. The city manager plans to combine different services of the city. For example, after July 1, the budget provides that the services of fire chief and city inspector be combined.

Mr. Heinz also pointed out that due to the growth of the city that better traffic control is necessary.

"I hope that the city may, in this coming year, be able to place modern street name signs on practically every street corner in the city," he said.

Tick Serum
C. A. Lockwood, Oregon State Game Supervisor, reminds anglers that it is wise to take tick serum shots before making a trip to the parts of eastern Oregon that are known to have occasional infected ticks. In the main this area is the north central part of the state.

Check Fishermen at Ten Mile
Members of the Ten Mile Lake Sportsmen's club plan to check fishermen using the angling season to determine how many anglers fish the lake and the kinds and numbers of fish caught. Under the direction of club president Myron Kilgore of Lakeside, boat dock operators and other members will contact fishermen daily throughout the fishing season. Conducted in cooperation with the State Game Commission, the project is expected to provide valuable information for both organizations.

Report Tagged Fish
Anglers are requested by the State Game Commission to report catches of tagged cutthroat trout this season from Mercer and Sutton Lakes, north of Florence. Fish from the Bandon Trout Hatchery were released into the lakes with small numbered metal tags attached to the right gill cover.

The Game Commission desires to determine facts relative to the growth, survival, migration tendencies, and other information concerning these plantings of legal size hatchery fish. Studies of this type are being carried on in various parts of the state to assist in the development of proper fish planting policies and other management methods.

Any angler catching a tagged fish in any Oregon waters is urged by the Commission to send the tag, along with information as to weight, length and place taken.
