Weed Control by 2,4-D Explained in OSC Bulletin

While 2,4-D is not the ultimate to all weed problems, it is an epoch making discovery that has caused a revolution in agriculture, write Virgil H. Freed, O.S.C. experiment station agronomist, and Rex Warren, extension service crops specialists, in their new extension bulletin number 687, "2, 4-D As A Weed Killer."

Copies of the bulletin are now available through local county agricultural agents' offices or by writing direct to the college. The 16-page bulletin is written in an easy-to-read style readily understandable by experienced farmers and city, part-time gardeners alike.

In the bulletin the authors point out that 2,4-D acts more like a disease in its effect on plants than as a poison. They say it may take several weeks after treatment with 2,4-D before a plant will die. First visible symptoms are stem and leaf twisting and bending. Unlike a disease, however, 2,4-D affects plants most when they are young and growing vigorously.

The broad classification of 2,4-D applications are explained by Freed and Warren. First are selective applications as they are called, where it is desired to control weeds in a

growing crop. The second method of application is termed nonselective. The latter is made to control a particular plant whether or not a crop is involved. Obviously, the two types of application require different approaches as to method and rate of 2,4-D application.

Among the plants in the bulletin termed susceptible to 2,4-D are ornamental shrubs, orchard trees, vetch, sweet clover, alfalfa, dandelion, mustard, plantain and young Russian thistle. Plants difficult to control with 2,4-D include blackberry, crabgrass, quackgrass, brackenfern, Russian knapweed and wild barley.

Recommendations for the use of 2,4-D on various types of plants are made in the bulletin.

TYEE TEACHER DIES ON FISHING TRIP

William Henry Schwindel, 53, instructor in the Tyee School, was found dead in a cabin at Sawyer Rapids, on the lower Umpqua river, about 4 p.m. Saturday afternoon. Death was believed due to a heart attack, Coroner Harry C. Stearns reported.

Schwindel was reportedly on his weekly fishing trip. He had stopped at the resort about midnight Friday and informed Mr. and Mrs. Hanson, the operators, that he was "very tired" and desired a cabin for the night, Stearns said. — Roseburg News Review.
