Science Research On International Basis Wins Favor

LAKE SUCCESS, New York—research laborator
Establishment of international research laboratories, in the fields of both natural and social sciences, is favored by national and international organizations and eminent scientists, a world-wide survey conducted by the United Nations reveals.

The inquiry, carried out under instructions of the U.N. Economic and Social Council, shows there is high interest in the principle of international research. Studies of astrophysics and geophysics, cartography, meteorology, and biological medicine and human sciences are among the leading suggestions made in answer to the survey. Generally speaking, the survey shows all scientists would like to see certain scientific problems studied on an international plane, and that many specialists in various fields desire coordination of efforts. Some of the answers stressed the importance of maintaining and developing branches of scientific research which scientists are inclined to neglect today in order to devote themselves more completely to fields of research recently encouraged by national authorities often because of special military significance.

One mathematician, for instance, thought that the United Nations could render considerable service to humanity by maintaining a large research center in the field of thermo-dynamics and fluid dynamics, which are basic in the study of the sciences of water and the atmosphere.

Astronomers who were queried are apparently unanimous in desiring the establishment of international laboratories. Certain eminent geophysicists would like to have floating laboratories and international upper atmosphere observation stations, while others would favor international research in physical and biological oceanography.

A group of sociologists proposed an international institute of human sciences to close the gap between man's advanced knowledge of his surroundings and his less advanced knowledge of himself.

The depths of the earth, the problems of soil erosion and deserts and the nature of diseases are among other subjects whose study on an international basis have also been proposed.

The inquiry is said to be the first attempt to formulate the views of competent circles throughout the world on scientific problems of international significance and interest.
