NOTICE OF TIMBER SALE

Sealed bids, marked outside "Bid for Timber", and addressed to the Regional Administrator, Bureau of Land Management, Region I, Swan Island Administration Building, Portland 18, Oregon, will be received until and opened at 10:30 a.m., Pacific Standard Time, May 11, 1948, for the purchase of all merchantable timber designated for cutting upon tracts hereinafter described; the cutting and removal of the timber to be carried out in accordance with the forest practice rules approved on July 7, 1938, by the Secretary of

the Interior. Each bid must state the amount per thousand feet, board measure, that will be paid for each species and the total consideration which will be paid for the timber. No bid for less than the appraised value will be considered. Each bid must be submitted in duplicate and be accompanied by a deposit. The deposit must be in the form of a certified check on a solvent bank and in favor of the Treasurer of the United States. The amount of the deposit will be \$5,000.00 provided the total amount bid is over \$5,000.00 and less than \$50,000.00; it will be \$10,000.00 provided the total amount bid is over \$50,000.00 and less than \$100,000.00; it will be 10% of the amount bid when the bid exceeds \$100,000.00. If the

The right is hereby reserved to waive technical defects in this advertisement; to reject all bids, or to award the timber for the amount of the highest bid to other than the highest bidder when necessary, pursuant to the Act of August 28, 1937 (50 Stat. 874), in order to provide a continued supply of timber to local industry and contribute to the permanence of the community which is dependent upon such industry. Military Spending Adds to Inflation, U. N. Body Finds

LAKE SUCCESS, New York—The "immense volume of resources" taken out of productive work by military and armaments expenditures in many countries now is an important contributing factor to worldwide inflation.

That was indicated here in a recent report on inflation by the United Nations Sub-Commission on Employment and Economic Stability.

"Any improvements in the world political situation which would make possible a reduction of this burden," declared the seven-member Sub-Commission, "would make a substantial contribution to the solution of the world's present economic difficulties."

However, a slash in armament spending would not alone solve the complicated problem of inflation, the Sub-Commission's report shows. Effectively to lick inflation, which leads eventually to creeping paralysis of the world's economic systems, a two-way attack is needed, the report indicates.

With methods adapted to different national situations, the Sub-Commission pointed out, over-all production must be increased and over-all demand reduced.

To equal the prewar standards of living, the report declares, production must be increased to at least one-quarter above prewar levels in order to take care of the world's increased population, the depletion of stocks and deterioration of equipment. Over the long run, such measures as mechanization and greater efficiency will furnish the solution, but immediately, attacks on crucial supply bottlenecks could bring quick production increases.

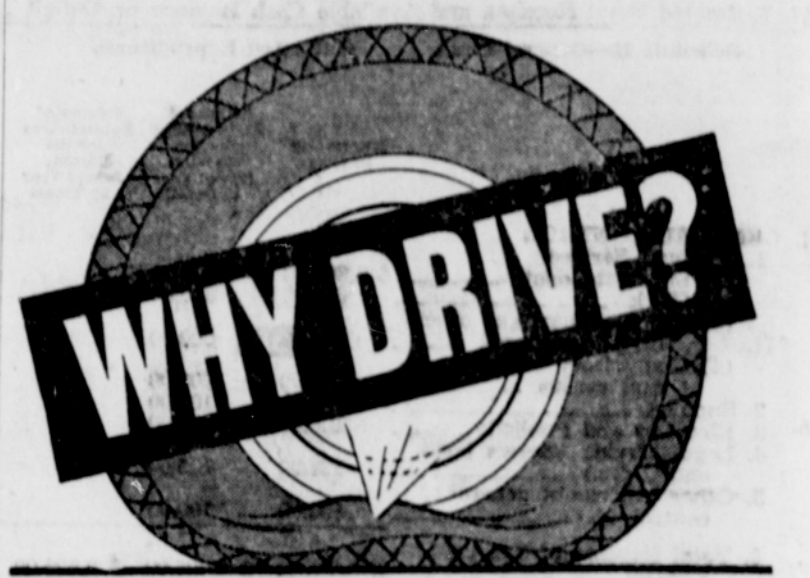

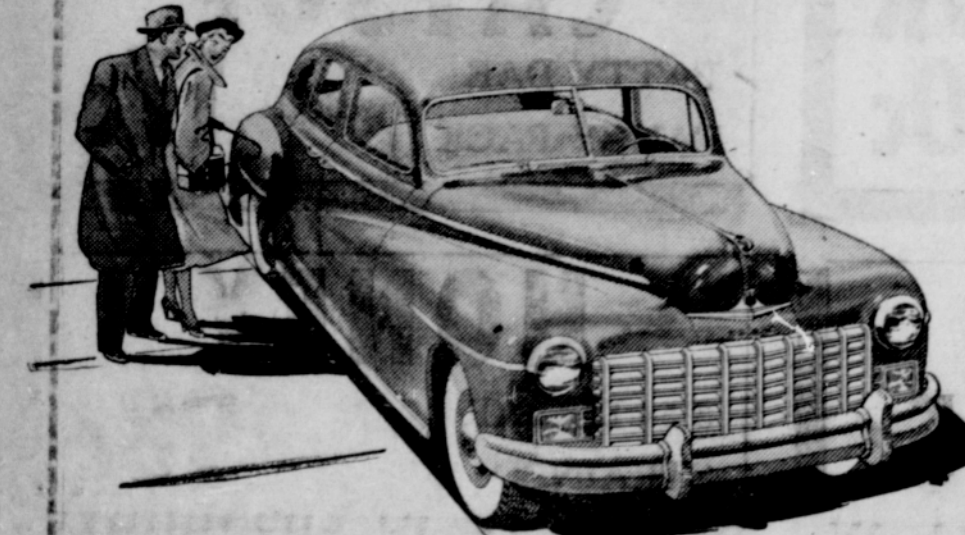
