NOTICE OF TIMBER SALE

Sealed bids, marked outside "Bid for Timber", and addressed to the Regional Administrator, Bureau of Land Management, Region I, Swan Island Administration Building, Portland 18, Oregon, will be received until and opened at 10:30 a.m., Pacific Standard Time, May 11, 1948, for the purchase of all merchantable timber designated for cutting upon tracts hereinafter described; the cutting and removal of the timber to be carried out in accordance with the forest practice rules approved on July 7, 1938, by the Secretary of the Interior. Each bid must state the amount per thousand feet board measure, that will be paid for each species in the total consideration which will be paid for the timber. No bid for less than the appraised value will be considered. Each bid must be submitted in duplicate and be accompanied by a deposit. The deposit must be in the form of a certified check on a solvent bank and in favor of the Treasurer of the United States. The amount of the deposit will be \$5,000.00 provided the total amount bid is over \$5,000.00 and less than \$50,000.00; it will be \$10,000.00 provided the total amount bid is over \$50,000.00

and less than \$100,000.00; it will be 10% of the amount bid when the total amount bid is less than \$5,000.00; the deposit shall be the amount of the bid. Empty Feed Lots May Spell Meat Shortage Soon

CHICAGO—Empty cattle lots dot the midwestern landscape today, a ghastly reminder of last summer's short corn crop. They provide a sad warning to people who like to eat meat. Market analysts said today the empty feed lots mean a tremendous reduction in meat production, starting in about 30 days. At this time of year, midwestern farms normally are jammed with cattle undergoing a luscious grain diet prior to being shipped to market. It's that grain, mostly corn, which puts weight on the animals to provide tasty meat. But it isn't that way this year. H. J. Gramlich, agricultural agent of the Chicago and Northwestern railway, said "many cattle feeders have temporarily folded up." "In a three-mile strip paralleling our line west of the Omaha stock yards, where normally several hundred thousand cattle are fattened each year, there does not now appear to be a single head," Gramlich said.

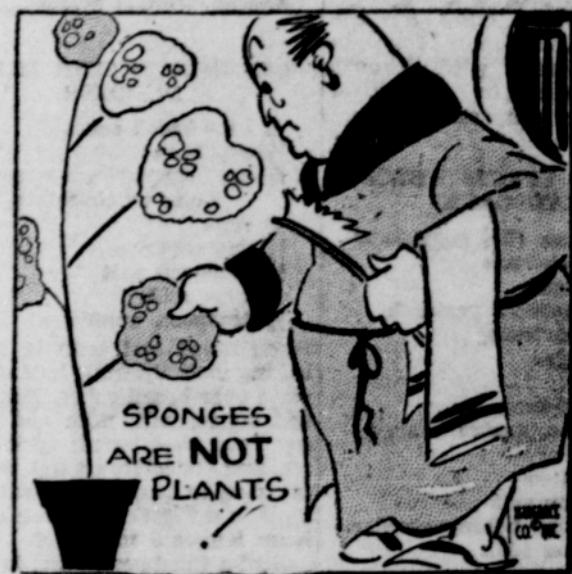

"In these resources some sections are more richly endowed than others, but this is not a sectional matter. Anything that builds a bigger West, builds a greater and stronger America for all our people."
