COTTAGE GROVE, LANE COUNTY, OREGON BY ADDING A NEW CHAPTER THEREON (WHICH WILL TAKE EFFECT JULY 1, 1948) ABOLISHING

THE OFFICE OF CITY MANAGER AND THE OFFICE OF MUNICIPAL JUDGE AND RESTORING UNTO THE MAYOR, CITY RECORDER AND COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, CERTAIN POWERS AND DUTIES AND FIXING THE DUTIES AND

POWERS OF THE MAYOR, CITY RECORDER AND COMMON COUNCIL; MAKING THE OFFICE OF THE CITY RECORDER AN ELECTIVE OFFICE AND REPEALING ALL ACTS AND PARTS OF ACTS IN CONFLICT HEREWITH. THE CITY OF COTTAGE

GROVE, OREGON, ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, LANE COUNTY, OREGON:

Section 1. (a) That the office of City Manager be, and the same is hereby, abolished to take effect on July 1, 1948.

(b) That the office of Municipal Judge be, and the same is hereby, abolished to take effect on July 1, 1948.

(c) That all of the powers and duties of the City Manager are hereby restored to the Mayor, City Recorder and the Common Council of the City of Cottage Grove, to be vested in said officers in the manner hereinafter set forth and the powers and duties of the Municipal Judge are hereby vested in the City Recorder.

Section 2. The elective officers of said City shall be a Mayor, a Treasurer, a Recorder who shall be ex-officio Clerk of the Council, all of whom shall be residents and qualified voters of said City and shall hold office for the term of two years and until their successors are elected and qualified. Councilmen shall also be elected in the manner provided for in Chapter 2, Section 1, of the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove.

Section 3. The Mayor shall preside at all meetings of the Common Council, and when absent the Council shall select one of their own number to preside pro tem. He shall be chief executive of the city and conservator of the peace, and to that end he shall, in the absence of the City Recorder or his inability or failure to act, be the judicial officer of said city, and shall try all persons accused of violating city ordinances, and shall have jurisdiction over all violations of any ordinances of said city, and may hold to bail, fine or commit persons found guilty thereof, and shall have the power to administer oaths, and to punish witnesses and others for contempt, by fine, not to exceed \$25.00, and in default of payment of such fine, by imprisonment in the city jail one day for every \$2.00 of such fine. He shall be a citizen of the United States, a freeholder within said city, and a qualified voter at the time of his election and an inhabitant of the city for at least one year before the day of his election. He shall take care that the laws of the state and ordinances of the city are duly observed and enforced. It shall be his duty to keep his office in some convenient place in said city, to be provided by the Common Council; to see that all officers of the City faithfully comply with and discharge their official duties, and to that end maintain an action or mandamus or other appropriate action against any delinquent officer; he shall, from time to time, give the Common Council such information and recommend such measures as he may deem advantageous to the city. In the business meetings of the Council, the Mayor shall not vote on any questions except when the vote of the Council ties, when the Mayor shall cast the deciding vote. All ordinances and resolutions shall, before they take effect, be presented to the Mayor, and if he approves thereof he shall sign the same, and such as he shall not sign he shall return to the Common Council with his objections thereto, by depositing the same with the City Recorder, to be presented to the Common Council at their next regular meeting thereafter. Upon the return of any ordinance or resolution by the Mayor, the vote by which the same was passed shall be deemed to have been reconsidered, and the question shall again be put upon the passage of the same, notwithstanding the objections of the Mayor; and if upon such vote the Common Council shall pass the same by a majority vote of the members of the Council it shall have the same effect as if approved by the Mayor. If any ordinance or resolution shall not be returned to the City Recorder by the Mayor within five days, Sundays excepted, after it shall be presented to him the same shall have the same force and effect as if approved by the Mayor.

It shall be the duty of the City Recorder to endorse upon each ordinance or resolution when such ordinance or resolution was delivered to the Mayor, and the time when the same shall be returned to his office by the Mayor. The Mayor shall have the power, when he deems it necessary, to appoint police officers, who shall act in conjunction with the Chief of Police; and in the absence of the Chief of Police the Mayor shall have the power to appoint a Deputy Chief of Police, who shall act and have the same powers as the Chief of Police until discharged by the Mayor. The compensation paid the deputy shall be the same as that paid the Chief of Police, and the amount so paid to said deputy shall be deducted from the salary of the Chief of Police.

Section 4. (a) The City Recorder shall be ex-officio Clerk of the Common Council, and as such shall keep the corporate seal and all the papers and records of the city, except as otherwise provided by this act, and keep a record of all the proceedings of the Common Council, at whose meetings it shall be his duty to attend. Copies of all papers filed in his office, and transcripts from the records of the Common Council, certified by him under the Corporate seal, shall be evidence in all courts the same as if the original were produced. He shall draw and sign all orders of the Treasurer in pursuance of any order or resolution of the Com-

mon Council, and keep a full and accurate account thereof in books provided for that purpose. In case of absence, sickness or inability of said Recorder to act as Clerk, the Common Council shall have the power to appoint a Recorder and Clerk pro tem, who shall have the authority, in the disability or absence of the Recorder, to perform all the duties of the Clerk of the Common Council, to certify and affix the corporate seal to copies and files or transcripts of records; and certificates so made by him shall have the same validity as if made by said Recorder, and his name of office, when acting as Clerk of the Common Council, shall be "Recorder and Ex-officio Clerk of the Common Council".

(b) The Recorder is authorized to administer oaths, and shall have the jurisdiction over all violations of city ordinances, and shall have jurisdiction and powers over all violations of city ordinances, and shall have jurisdiction of the Peace, and his territorial jurisdiction shall extend to and be co-extensive with the limits and boundaries of the County of Lane, and the law governing a Justice of the Peace, so far as applicable, shall apply to all his proceedings.

He shall try all persons accused of violating city ordinances, without a jury, unless the party defendant in court the sum of \$6.00, which sum shall be used as payment of the per diem of such jury for one day; and if the cause require more than one day, the defendant shall be required to deposit an additional \$6.00, for each day, in advance, before proceeding with the cause, and if he fails so to do, the jury shall be discharged, and the cause proceed without a jury and before the Recorder as if no jury had been called; and the witnesses in such trials shall be entitled to no compensation for their attendance, unless the Council, by ordinance, shall otherwise direct; and the jury shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by ordinance of said city. The Recorder shall have the power, as such, to punish witnesses and others for contempt, by fine, by imprisonment, in the city jail one day for every \$2.00 of such fine imposed; keep a journal of all his proceedings and of the proceedings of the Council, and perform such other duties as the charter and the ordinances of the City may require.

Section 5. In addition to other powers and duties of the Council as set forth in the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove said Common Council shall have the following powers and duties:

1. The Common Council shall have the power to appoint the heads of all departments who are not elected officials, and to appoint all other City officers and employees and to have general supervision and control over them, except as otherwise provided in this charter.

2. The Common Council shall have the power to remove from office any officer appointed by said Council for good cause, upon a majority vote of the Councilmen. Any officer elected by the people may be removed for good cause by said Council upon a three-fourths vote of the Council. Continued absence from meetings and neglect of duty by any officer elected or appointed shall, unless for good reasons, be deemed good cause for removal; but no officer shall be removed unless first furnished with a copy of the charges for a period of five days before any procedure be had. The Common Council shall fix the time and place for the trial of such officer, of which not less than five days notice shall be given him, and shall have the power to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of papers, and to hear and determine the case; and if such officer shall refuse or neglect to appear and answer such charge, the Common Council shall declare the office vacant.

3. The Mayor and the Common Council shall be the administrative heads of the City government and all the powers and duties heretofore vested in the City Manager are hereby delegated to the Mayor and the Common Council of said City.

4. To have control of all public utilities owned or operated by the City.

5. To have general supervision over all City property and its use by the public or city employees.

6. To see that the provisions of all franchises, leases, contracts, permits and privileges granted by the City are fully observed.

Section 6. The office of Municipal Judge is hereby abolished and all the duties and powers of said Municipal Judge are hereby vested in the City Recorder, acting as judicial officer of the City of Cottage Grove, and said powers and duties shall be those hereinbefore set forth.

Section 7. All provisions of the Charter and Charter Amendments of the City of Cottage Grove in conflict with the provisions of this Charter Amendment and enacted prior to the time this act takes effect are hereby repealed in so far as they conflict herewith.

Section 8. This Charter Amendment shall be in full force and effect on and after July 1, 1948.
