## C. G. Trapshooters Place Eleventh In Telegraph Meet

Upon winning 30 of their 38 matches, the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club placed 11th in the Oregon Journal's first Telegraph Trapshooting tournament, which ended last week.

St. Johns was first and Eugene second in the tournament which attracted entries from 51 cities and towns in Oregon.

By finishing among the top 25 teams the Cottage Grove club automatically qualified for the state trapshoot meet which will be held June 13 at Portland.

Leading scorers on the local squad were W. W. Harpole, who broke 282 targets out of a possible 300, W. Hilleman with a score of 279, Harry Rentle and Jack Robertson each with 273 and Hap Wolfard with 270.

## C. G. Nosed Out In Foto-Finish

Unlike the proverbial month of March, the Cottage Grove track men went in like Lions and emerged same in the District 4 track meet at Hayward Field, last Friday.

The Grovemen amassed a 42 1/2 point total to garner third place in the meet, a scant point behind Eugene and nearly as close to the victors from Springfield who had 44 points.

High point man on Coach Bob Dusenberry's team was Wes Thompson who won the 440, placed 4th in the century, 5th in the broad jump, and assisted the relay team to a berth in the state meet.

Other members who qualified for the state meet include Les Porter (see cut), Al Martin, Ken Harker, and Leo Hawkins.

### Miserable Weather

In a word, the weather was miserable. Despite this fact former records fell by the handfuls. However, because of a moderately strong south wind the new records are not acceptable as yet.

The 'A' division bettered marks in four events and the 'B' division improved on every preceding record except the high jump. The 'B' had only last year's marks to shoot at however, as that was the first time the schools were separated in the District meet.

High point individuals were Bill Powell of Eugene in the 'A' division and John Downing of Mowhawk in the 'B' division, both with 16 1/2 totals. Dale Webb of Creswell broke last year's records in both the 440 and the 220 and was an-

chor man on the second-place relay team in the 'B' division.

The opening session of the clinic will be held Friday afternoon and will be devoted to movies and to a demonstration of offense. Aiken and his assistants will discuss and demonstrate the Oregon type of T formation.

## First Trout Tag Is Received at Game Office

To H. B. Kilmer, of Florence, Oregon, goes the honor of being the first angler to send a tag from a trout into the offices of the Oregon State Game Commission this season. The tagged trout caught by Mr. Kilmer was a cutthroat, nine inches long and was taken in Sutton lake.

Robert Holloway, in charge of surveys for the Game Commission announced that after checking the number of the tag it was discovered that the fish was liberated in Mercer lake on February 19 of this year. He pointed out that checking the migratory habits of the various species of trout was one of the purposes of the extensive tagging program being carried on this season by the Commission. He also urged that all anglers be on the lookout, no matter where they are fishing, for trout bearing metal tags or trout that have been marked by having certain fins clipped. Upon taking tagged fish the angler is asked to send the tag along with information as to where the fish was taken and its size to the Oregon State Game Commission, P. O. Box 4136, Portland 8, Oregon.
