"Lane county government has not broken down. It is not now and never has been shot through with graft. It is run by honest, hard-working citizens. Its principal weakness is the system of taxation set up by state law not producing the money to get things done. Changing to a county manager will not affect the tax situation nor produce any more income to maintain roads, schools or any other governmental functions. The manager will bring more taxes just as he has in every city under managership." —Springfield News.

"The general reaction to the idea is that we might be inviting another Pendergast scandal with the adoption of the manager plan, since the affairs of the county would be turned over to a manager and he could in turn be influenced by a small 'clique' who would attempt to run the county affairs." —Cottage Grove Sentinel.
