County Long Time Needs Surveyed

(Delayed)

The long-time conservation needs of Lane County were given an intensive and thorough going over at a Conservation Needs Survey meeting held Friday, May 7, at the Lane County Fairgrounds.

"A growing realization by legislators and by all people throughout the entire country that conservation is not just a problem of the farmer but is rather the problem of all the people, is leading to greater and greater emphasis on a long-range agricultural conservation program," according to Ernest E. Schrenk, Chairman of the Lane County Agricultural Conservation Association.

Schrenk explained to the group that the meeting was called for the purpose of reviewing the 1946 conservation needs survey figures with an eye to bringing the needs figures into line with recent conservation developments. Although a great deal of care was used in obtaining the 1946 figures, it was apparent that some of the practice totals such as those for open ditch drainage, riprap, sod waterways, and other erosion control practices, were out of line. Total Lane County Conservation needs for individual practices will be released at a later date following a review of the needs figures by the County Committee on Friday, May 14.

NEW 4-H CLUB AGENT

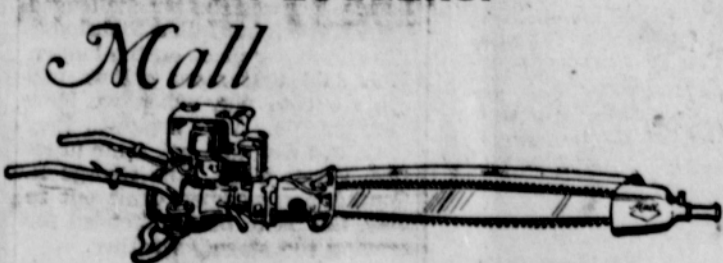
