THE MAN WHO LOVES GOD

What is the best definition that can be given of the man who truly loves God? Perhaps the apostle John answers our question in I John 5:3: "For this is the love of God, that we keep his commandments: and his commandments are not grievous." This condition set forth by the inspired writer may be called the test of love. It will enable a man to determine whether he actually loves God. Naturally most men claim to love Him but how many are willing to obey His commandments? The man who thinks that he loves God but will not keep His commandments is deceiving himself. Jesus said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments." John 14:15. These are two of the many scriptures that teach the necessity of man's obedience to God's laws. The thought is well expressed by the ancient author of Ecclesiastes. In the last chapter and verse thirteen he said: "Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: Fear God, and keep his commandments; for this is the whole duty of man." God has commanded that you do certain things to become a Christian. Study these scriptures carefully: You must have faith, Heb. 11:6; you must repent of sin, Acts 17:30; you must confess your faith in Christ as the Son of God, Acts 8:37; Rom. 10:10; you must be baptized for the remission of your sins, Acts 2:38; Mark 16:16. The man who loves God will obey these and all other commandments of God. He will not make the mistake of saying that some are not essential to salvation. The man who loves God is not interested in trying to find non-essential commands. All of the commandments that God has given for this Christian age are essential.

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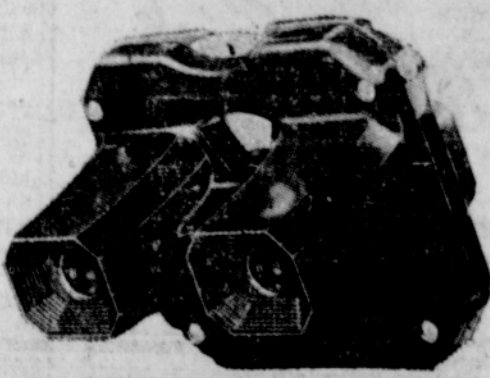
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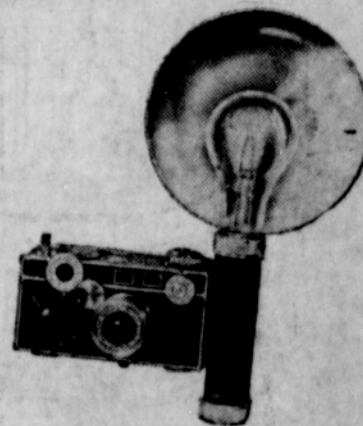
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
