

Sudan Grass May Be Best Bet for Extra Hay Crop

Sudan grass will be the "last chance" pasture or hay crop seedling possibility on much land in western Oregon where rains prevented planting of other crops last fall and this spring, observes E. R. Jackman, O. S. C. extension specialist in farm crops, who adds that seedling time for Sudan grass will be about June 1.

Although Sudan grass is not the best forage crop, planting it may prove insurance against possible hay and pasture shortages later, points out Jackman. As a hay crop, Sudan grass compares well with spring grain. As a pasture crop it will not give nearly as much feed as alfalfa or red clover, for example, but it will furnish green feed during the hot, dry summer months.

"Cut in Full Bloom"

To make Sudan grass hay, Jackman recommends that it be cut when it is in full bloom. Sudan hay will be slow to cure, due to the high moisture content of the stems. The hay is palatable, although it will not equal legume hay because of its lower protein content. It does compare favorably as hay with such grains as rye and oats.

Sudan grass is not commonly used for silage, since it matures during the dry months, although it is about equal to corn silage in feed quality. No preservative is necessary in Sudan silage, Jackman adds.

Most of the Sudan grass crop grown annually in western Oregon is used for pasture. It grows vigorously during the normally dry months of July, August and September. By pasturing it during these months, barn feeding of livestock is reduced. A good stand will provide about 75 days of pasture with a carrying capacity of two cows per acre.

"Superior Seed"

The so-called "sweet Sudan" from Texas appears to be a definitely superior type seed. It does not develop prussic acid poisoning after frost, it yields more, and is usually preferred by livestock. Sudan grass is a hot weather plant which will not do well if seeded too early on land that is wet or cold, Jackman emphasizes.

GRASS AND GRAIN BOTH NEEDED BY GOOD COWS

Dairy cows tend to turn up their noses at grain feeds as soon as they are turned out on early grass pastures, but continued high milk production depends upon this supplemental feed, states H. P. Ewalt, O.S.C. extension dairyman.

Cows will graze from 100 to 150 pounds of grass daily. Ewalt points out, especially if it is lush and there is plenty of it. This amount of green feed will furnish food enough to maintain the cow and enable her to produce from one to one-half pound of butterfat daily. For sustained production above these figures, cows will require a supplemental ration of grain.

On abundant early spring pastures particularly, cows are inclined to fill themselves on grass and refuse the grain supplement. They usually resume normal grain consumption, however, after they have been on pasture a week or two. Ewalt warns dairymen not to reduce the grain ration and then neglect to raise it when cows will again consume the grain necessary to keep up top milk production.

Feeding trials at O.S.C. with cows on irrigated and grass pasture have proved the necessity and value of feeding according to production. Ewalt states. Station circular of information numbered 310, entitled, "Feeding Grain to Dairy Cows on Irrigated Land," contains tables designed to indicate how much grain supplement to feed cows

producing various amounts of milk. Some cows will not eat as much grain as recommended, but for maximum production successful dairymen made every effort to get them to eat the amount required.

Ewalt states that 9 or 10 percent digestible protein is about the practical limit in the grain mixture. Higher concentrations will not give proportionate increases in milk. Cows are fed individually on the basis of their production.

STUDENTS SHOULD HAVE SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER

Students who expect to work this summer inside industrial or commercial employments should make certain now that they have their social security account number cards. Carl D. Monroe, manager of the Eugene office of the Social Security Administration, said today.

"Of course, students who already have social security cards," Monroe said, "should not apply again, because the same account number is used during an individual's entire life. But persons not having cards should get them before starting to work and show the card to the employer so that their wages may be properly reported, identified, and credited to their social security accounts."

Finding Job 'Major Problem' For Oregon Vets

Although unemployment in the past year dropped to third place in importance among the nation's war veterans, in Oregon finding a suitable job is still a major problem for the ex-serviceman, judging from a comparison made today by the state Department of Veterans' Affairs of state and national employment figures.

After a recent survey of 21 veterans' centers in the major cities of the country, the National Social Welfare assembly of New York city reported that the high cost of living and housing shortages moved to the fore, replacing unemployment as the most pressing problem facing World War II veterans today.

Still Vital Problem

While Oregon veteran counselors agreed that housing and the cost of living are headaches for the local ex-GI, they would not go along with the survey's contention that "earning a living" had become less vital.

The national survey reported 500,000 jobless veterans at the end of 1947, of a total vet population of 18,600,000, or 2.6 per cent unemployed.

Oregon figures, on the other hand, disclose more than 7.1 per cent unemployed, with 14,000 veterans registered for work out of an estimated 200,000 veteran population. This means veterans of all wars.

Unemployment Still High

The striking thing in the Oregon picture, a local representative of the federal veterans employment service points out, is that unemployment is as high today in Oregon as it was a year ago, despite the fact that more people here have jobs than ever before, including the war years.

This is attributed to the continuing in-migration to the West Coast, of people either unskilled in Oregon's industrial crafts or unable to fit into the seasonal pattern of work prevailing here, according to state employment service officials.

The federal census bureau supports the in-migration factor, giving Oregon a 39.2 per cent population increase from 1940 to 1947, as against a national increase of only 8.9 per cent.
