2 London Girls Win 4-H Awards

Two girls from the London 4-H club, Betty Clark and Phyllis Garman, have been announced as winners of half-scholarships offered by Lane County for outstanding 4-H-ers in club activities this year. The records are taken from reports sent in during the year, which are on file at the county club office. Twenty of the scholarships, valued at ten dollars each, were awarded. Winners may use these half-scholarships to apply toward 4-H club summer school tuition, or club camp tuition, but each should notify the club office immediately whether or not they will use the award.

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A new version of old-fashioned pound cake for your festive occasions is pictured above. Finely ground almonds in the cake itself make it rich without too much butter; sliced almonds on top give it a gala touch.

It's amazing what the judicious use of a few almonds will do for party desserts. They have the faculty of adding a dressy touch as you will find out when you try the recipes we have for you today.

First is the Almond Pound Cake pictured on this page. This simple recipe makes a cake to be proud of and just right for the buffet supper table.

ALMOND POUND CAKE
1 cup finely sliced blanched almonds
1/2 cup shortening (part butter)
3 cups granulated sugar
3 eggs
1 1/2 cups sifted all purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup finely ground blanched almonds
1/4 teaspoon almond extract

grease loaf pan (approximately 9 by 4 by 3 inches) very heavily. Sprinkle sliced almonds on bottom and sides of pan, reserving a portion for top of cake. Cream together shortening and sugar thoroughly. Add beaten egg yolks and blend. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add to creamed mixture alternately with milk. Add ground almonds and fold into batter and pour into nut-lined pan. Sprinkle remainder of sliced almonds over top. Bake in a 300 degree oven 1 1/2 to 2 hours. Makes 1 loaf.

Something pretty special in the way of a dessert is:

ALMOND JAM TORTE
1/2 cup roasted unblanched almonds
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1 egg
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 cup sifted cake flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup strawberry or cherry jam

Chop almonds. Cream shortening and sugar together thoroughly. Add lightly beaten egg, lemon juice and rind, and blend well. Stir in dry ingredients sifted together; add almonds and mix well. Spread in greased 9-inch layer pan, spreading batter higher around edges of pan. Spread center with jam. Bake in a 350 degree oven about 45 minutes. Cut in wedges and serve warm. Garnish with whipped cream if desired. Serves 6 to 8.

PEACH ALMOND MERINGUES
2 egg whites
Few grains of salt
1/2 cup sifted confectioner's sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 cup chopped roasted almonds
Whipped cream
Canned cling peaches

Beat egg whites and salt until stiff but not dry. Gradually add sugar, beating after each addition until mixture will stand in peaks. Fold in flavoring and almonds. Drop in mounds about 3 inches in diameter onto ungreased paper on cookie sheet. Hollow centers slightly with back of spoon. Bake 45 minutes to 1 hour in a 250 degree oven. Meringues should be light brown and quite dry. Slide paper onto wet cloth and loosen meringues with spatula. Cool. Fill with sweetened whipped cream. Top with sliced peaches. Makes 4 or 5 meringues.

23 Students Are Presented May 22 In Dance Recital

Twenty-three students of dance and several featured soloists were presented by Mrs. Harold Hicks in a dance recital held in the armory Saturday evening, May 22, at eight o'clock.

Miss Tyke Brady, the "star of the show," will travel to Washington the first of June to continue summer studies in ballet. Only thirteen years of age she has been a pupil of Mrs. Hicks for the past three years.

The temporary stage of blue and pink crepe paper was brightly illuminated by several flood lights placed in front to produce good lighting effects upon the costumes of the performers.

The first number was a ballet, "One Alone," by the advanced class who wore harem costumes of pastel shades trimmed in sequins. At the close of the dance Beverly Seitz and Sue Chadwell did hand-springs and backward flips followed by Marilyn White who did a novelty acrobatic number, "The Coffee-grinder." Dressed as cowboys in red shirts, vests, and boots with fringe trim and complete with hats, guns and holsters, the beginners-group did a tap dance and song entitled "Cowboy Joe." Tyke Brady, for the first of her three solo numbers, was dressed in a pink ruffled costume and she danced to the music, "Desert Song." Marilyn White and Sue Chadwell, wearing short print skirts and white blouses, used large, red bandanas in performing a rumba tap to the tune of "Mama Inez." Mrs. Herriot Higgins sang "Manana," followed by an encore, "The Dickey Bird Song."

During the intermission Mrs. Evelyn Lewis, piano accompanist for the program, rendered two piano numbers, "Tico Tico" and "Golden Earrings." She has been accompanist at all sessions of the dancing classes.

The second part of the program began with a waltz clog to the music of "Champagne Waltz" by the advanced class dressed in short black skirts and white blouses with long puffed sleeves. Elaine de Lassus, a member of the beginners class, sang "Give a Little Whistle." The intermediate class in black and white costumes did the dance "Bobby Buck" to the music of "Honeydew Rose." "Can't Help Lovin' That Man" and "Please Be Kind" were the two solos sung by Mrs. Hicks, followed by a short dance featuring graceful rhythm and movements. Dressed in a military ballet costume, Tyke Brady did her second solo number, "Military Toe Tap." The entire dance was done on her toes.

The first number in the last portion of the program was a ballet, "Rose Marie," by the beginners in white costumes sprinkled with gold sequins. To conclude the program Mrs. Suzanne Pulley sang "Indian Love Call" followed by Tyke Brady, in Indian costume, performing an advanced toe dance to the same music. Members of the intermediate class, also dressed as Indians, then did a rhythmic ballet to the song, "Pass the Peace Pipe." While they remained on the stage Miss Brady returned for a toe strut to "Totem Tom Tom." Mrs. Pulley ended the recital by singing the last part of "Indian Love Call."

Reginald Fauquier served as master of ceremonies and presented bouquets of flowers to Mrs. Hicks, Tyke Brady, Sue Chadwell and Marilyn White. Mrs. Hicks gave each of her pupils a single gardenia before the recital and they in turn had presented her with an orchid.

IS IT TRUE?

An expression that is often heard and one that is believed by many to be wise and just is this: "Every man has the right to worship God as he pleases." The question should be asked: Is it true? The average person has accepted this principle stated above with no thought as to its truth. It may sound good and wise until one has begun to see what it really means. Does a man have the right to worship God as man pleases or as God has pleased? No, here is a new thought, isn't it? The truth of the matter is had the right of choosing how he would worship God. The Bible teaches that God has always told man clearly and definitely HOW man was to worship Him. He has never left it to man's choice. God has always given man sufficient instructions as to the method or manner of worship and has accepted only that worship which man offered according to God's commands. Jesus taught that two elements—the spirit of worship and the truth of worship—determined its value before God. Read the following from John 4:24: "God is a Spirit: and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth." How does God regard worship that is done according to man's standard instead of God's? Read it: "But in vain do they worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men." Matt. 15:9. So we must conclude that although man may have a legal right to worship God as he pleases, he has the scriptural right to worship only as God has instructed him.

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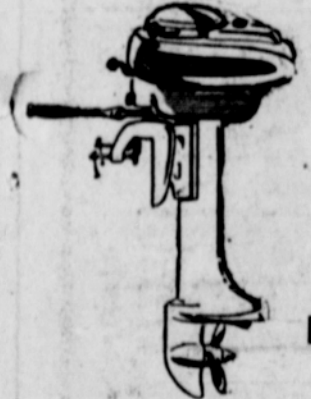
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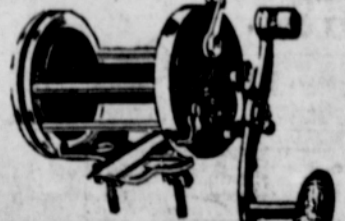
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
