CLEAR LAKE RECEIVES SPRING TROUT PLANTING

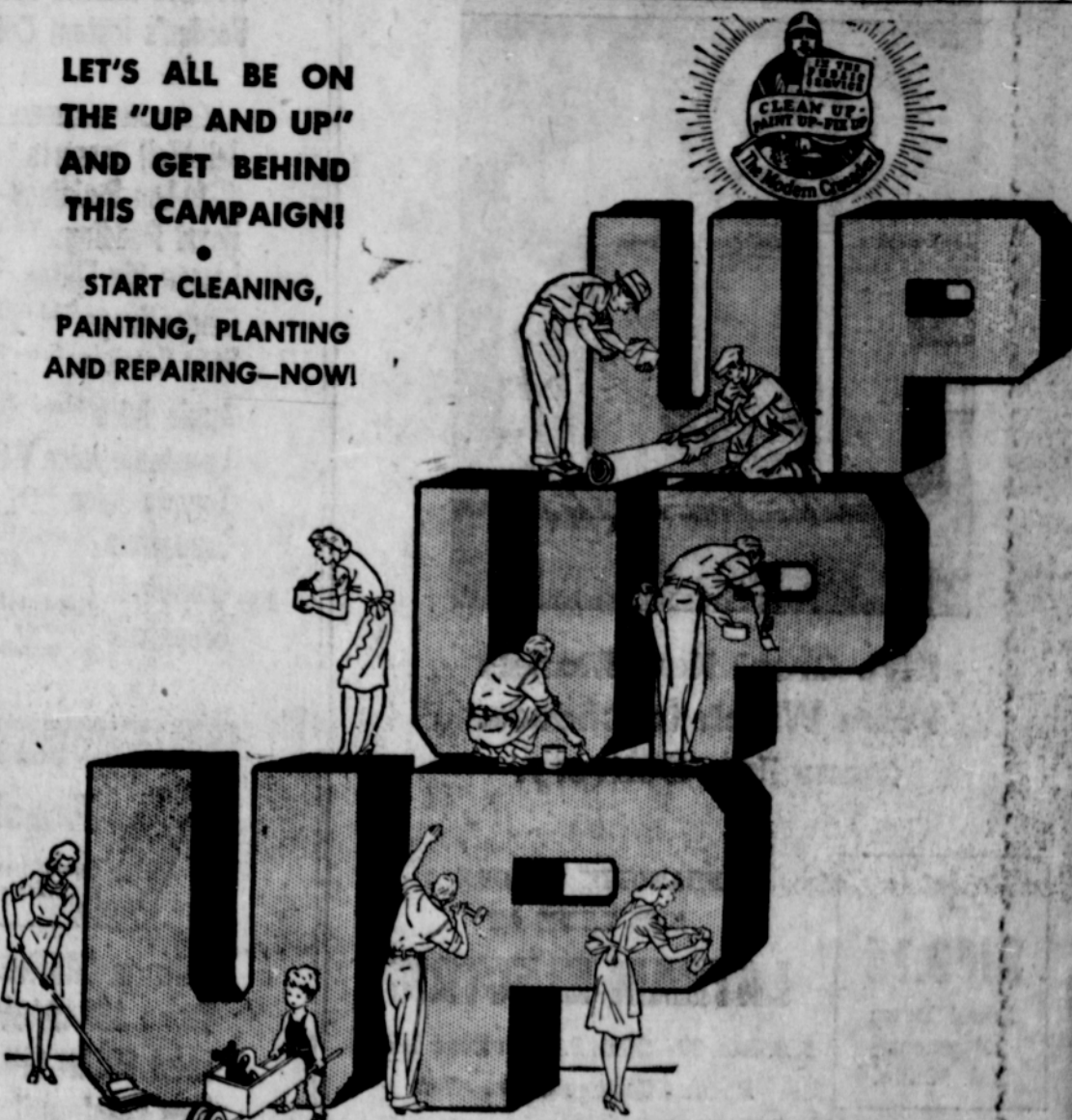
