Cost of Living Surveyed by ILO In 21 Countries

MONTREAL—Prices throughout most of the world rose more gradually after the start of World War II than after the start of the First World War, an analysis made by the International Labor Office (ILO) reveals. Using 1929 as the start of World War I—as one base year, and 1914—as the start of World War II—the ILO survey shows the comparative price situation approximately three years after the end of each war.

In fifteen of the twenty-one countries studied, the index of food, clothing and their basic household expenses rose more sharply from 1914 to 1921 than between the years 1939 and 1948. Only in France, India, Brazil, Chile, Peru and Spain did the cost of living climb more rapidly during the latter period, the report says.

For a resident of the United States, the cost of living at the end of February 1948, was 69 per cent above the 1939 index. In 1920, a 100 per cent rise had been registered over 1914. This figure, however, dropped to 78 per cent during the recession of 1921.

At the end of March 1948, Canadian prices were 49 per cent

above those in 1939. But in 1920, the cost of living was 90 per cent higher than at the start of the First World War.

In Peru, on the other hand, prices at the end of February 1948 were more than three times what they were in 1939, whereas in 1920 and 1921 they were about double those at the start of the war.

Chileans—the survey shows—were paying almost four times as much for basic commodities at the end of January 1948 than nine years before. This differs considerably from World War I figures, when in 1920 and 1921 prices were only one and a half times above 1914.

In Great Britain, where price controls are still in effect, a 29 per cent increase in living costs occurred between 1939 and July 1947, compared to a 155 per cent increase between 1914 and 1920.

Sweden, Denmark and Norway have seen increases of 54, 61 and 58 per cent respectively, while after the first war prices went up as much as 136, 137 and 300 per cent in that order.

The survey indicates that in Paris, France last March prices were nearly 14 times as high as in 1939. This compares with an increase by 1921 of little less than three times over costs at the start of World War I.

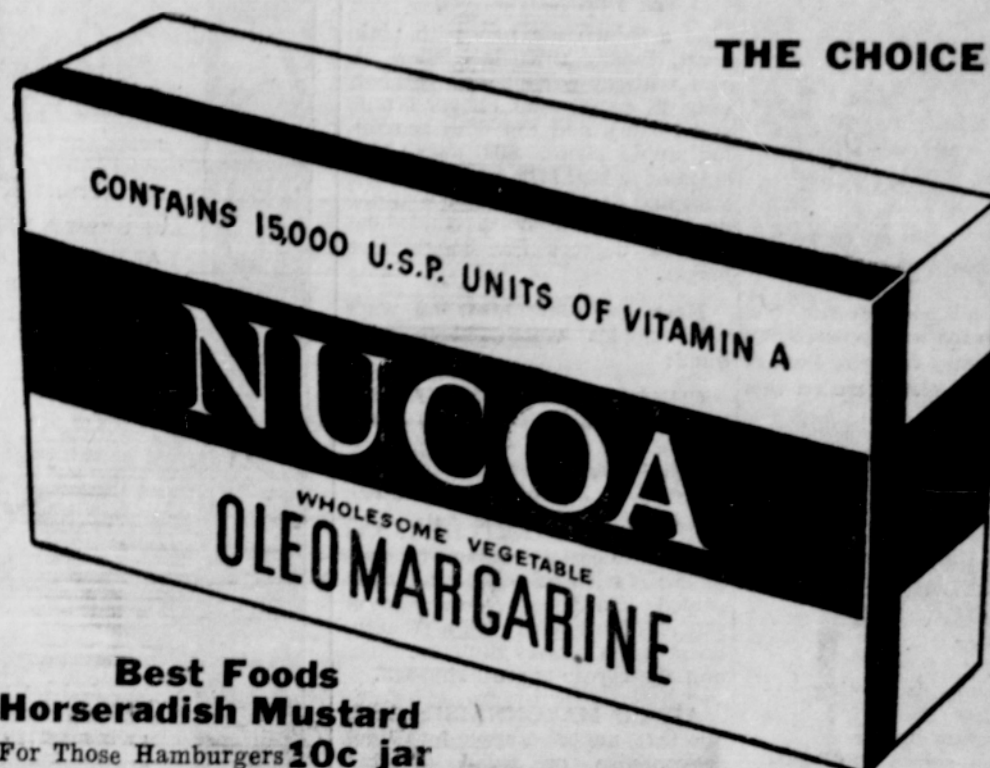
