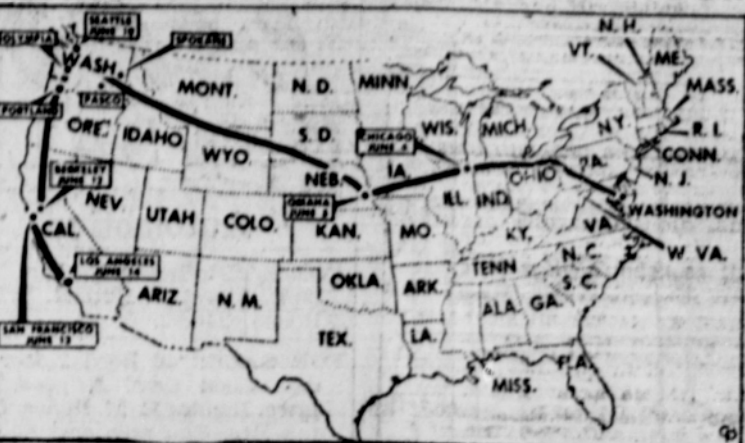

Subject to possible change, the itinerary calls for a speech at Chicago on June 4, followed by a talk on June 5 at Omaha. From Omaha, the President will proceed to the Northwest, appearing in Seattle on June 10. He will visit Portland for the Rose Festival. His address at the University of California at Berkeley on June 12 will be followed by a speech on June 13 at San Francisco at Flag Day exercises. The Chief Executive will speak on June 14 to a group of editors and start his return trip after that affair. While in Washington, the President will spend at least one day at Olympia as guest of Governor Wallgren. Truman will also visit Spokane and the Columbia basin project at Pasco. (International)

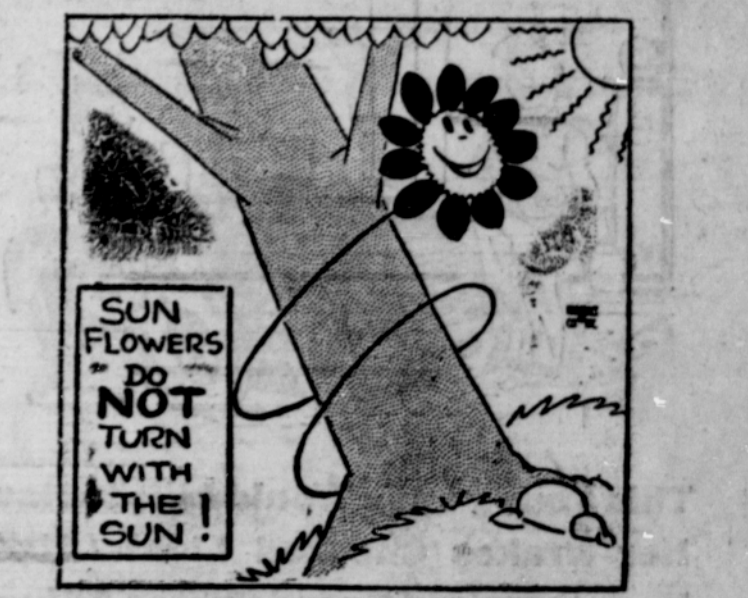
