## Household Hint

Hard-cooked eggs won't be so likely to turn dark if you crack the shells immediately after you remove the eggs from the heat, and let them stand in cold water for about 10 minutes. They will peel more easily too. When you slice them, dip the knife blade or wire cutter in warm water. This reduces the possibility of the egg breaking when it is being sliced.
