

Navy Trade Schools Are Unlimited for Month of June

Due to the large graduating classes this year the U. S. Navy has opened all of its trade schools with no quota restrictions. All high school graduates may enlist in the Navy with their choice of trade schools. This unlimited quota is for the month of June only, and on July 1 there will be a limited quota for each school.

High school graduates may take the choice of one of the following schools, commissaryman, electrician's mate, I. C. electrician, fire controlman, metalsmith, engineer, radarman, radioman, sonarman, storekeeper, disbursing clerk, yeoman, submarine, airman. And for young graduates who are interested in the Navy's Construction Battalion the following schools are available: driver, sur-

veyor, mechanic, steelworker, builder, utilities man and construction electrician. Chief L. J. Reinholdt of the local Navy Recruiting Station, located in the post office at Eugene, Oregon, advises all high school graduates to take advantage of this unlimited quota and pick a school of their choice before July 1 when the vacancies for these schools will be limited. Accordion Instruction and Rentals
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Forestry Campaign Planned by Latin American Nations

RIO DE JANEIRO—Despite untold wealth in forestry resources, Latin America today imports twice as much wood as it exports. But in the next decade this situation is expected to be reversed as a result of the common forestry development program presented to 21 countries that met at the recent Latin American Forestry Conference at Teresopolis, Brazil.

The virgin forests of Latin America are one of the world's few remaining reservoirs of wood. Covering over two billion acres of land, this enormous timber wealth is made up of a very great variety of species—there are over 2,700 kinds of palm alone—but in some instances nearly pure stands of commercial timber exist. Examples are the crabwood in Venezuela and the Guianas, mora and possum in Surinam, and quebracho in the Argentine.

The first specialized forestry conference to be held in the history of Latin America was called by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) in April 1948, because the present acute timber shortage throughout the world offers an exceptional opportunity for forestry development in Latin America. The development program proposed at Teresopolis covers the next decade and is designed to strengthen the economies of all Latin American countries. At the same time, this program might make available increased supplies of timber for the reconstruction of Europe.

The needs of Europe are so considerable that Latin America might therefore count on an important market there. The role of FAO in developing a common program to utilize these forest resources to the utmost was stressed by the Conference. The major work of FAO was seen as providing a continuous flow of counsel and technical advice, which should be channeled through a central office in Latin America. This office, to be known as the Regional Working Group, would consist of forestry technicians with previous Latin American experience. It also was recommended that a Latin American Forestry and Forest Products Commission, consisting of representatives of all interested Latin American governments, be established to promote suitable broad regional policies.

The other major role of FAO was seen as encouraging capital investments from both private and public sources. Success of the whole plan of development was based on the ability of Latin American nations to obtain the machinery and other equipment needed for constructive exploitation, delegates said. The Conference generally hoped that FAO could support the objectives of projects requiring credits from the appropriate international agencies or from private sources.

There are great obstacles to be overcome before these recommendations can be effectively carried out. For example, Latin America needs 1,000 professional and over 2,000 sub-professional trained foresters to assure the proper management to its magnificent forest resources. These figures were based on estimates received by FAO from 10 of the 20 Latin American governments. Reports from 12 countries indicate that only 300 professional and 450 sub-professional foresters are now at work in Latin America and that many of these would like to have more intensive training.

But if the obstacles to development are enormous, the results can be correspondingly great. The contributions which Latin America could make to the world timber supply was pointed out before the Conference by Marcel LeLoup, Director of the FAO Forestry and Forest Products Division, who said that if each of the two billion acres of forestland in Latin America could be made to yield annually as little as three and one-half cubic feet of timber for construction and industrial use, world production of wood in these categories could be increased by one-quarter.
